# SUSSEX WILDLIFE TRUST Shakespeare's Starlings - Three Act

Tragedy

Hey y'all, I'm mailing in this month's article from my vacation at Bodega Bay on the foggy Pacific coast of California. It may be all organic coffee, art galleries, surfer dudes and flip-flops but this quaint coastal community is notorious for being the location for a most sinister film: 'The Birds' (1963). Alfred Hitchcock has long gone but flocks of the film's stars still sit ominously perched on telegraph wires as if unaware that the portly director yelled "cut" 56 years ago. But unlike the local hummingbirds, phoebes and chickadees these particular birds look reassuringly familiar to me. They are Sturnus vulgaris, the European Starling, the same species we see wheeling around Brighton's West Pier in their dramatic amoeboid murmurations. And, like me, they don't really belong here. The Starlings are here thanks to Henry IV. Well, 'Henry IV Part 1' to be precise.

Act I: London, 1597. William Shakespeare scribbles the word 'Starling' in his epic tale of power and treachery. With that feathered flourish of his guill, Shakespeare

would unknowingly be the author of an ecological catastrophe that would play out until the present day.



Act II: New York, 1877. Enter stage right Eugene Schieffelin, a socialite who would later be remembered as "an eccentric at best, a lunatic at worst". He chaired the American Acclimatization Society, a group which, despite their nationalistic sounding name, were very keen to welcome foreigners. In fact, their aim was to import animals of economic or cultural interest from the Old World to

the New. Schieffelin, a big fan of Shakespeare, had a dream: to populate America with every bird mentioned in Shakespeare's writings. And so the bard's birds were boxed up in England and brought to New York where Skylarks, Pied Wagtails, Bullfinches, Nightingales, Chaffinches and many more were 'liberated' into Central Park. The majority of them died. But on March 6th, 1890, 60 Starlings (a bird mentioned only once by Shakespeare) were released in Central Park and they fared better. Much better. Today there are around 200 million of them across the United States.

Act III: United States, present day. The story of Schieffelin's Shakespearian motivation may just be an urban legend but the legacy of his misguided American Acclimatization Society is very real. Today European Starlings are widely vilified by Americans as aggressive pests that have destroyed precious ecosystems and turfed out native species. Which is pretty rich coming from a bunch of invasive Europeans who have been doing just that for the past few centuries! And since then there have been many who have appeared hellbent on dismantling this country's environmental regulations which protect wildlife, the landscape and our planet. But sure, let's blame the birds. As Mr. Shakespeare (almost) once wrote, "The fault, dear Brutus, is not in our Starlings, / But in ourselves".

# **BOOK REVIEW**

# HILLBILLY ELEGY BY J.D. VANCE. A MEMOIR OF A FAMILY AND CULTURE IN CRISIS

Here surely is a rags to riches story of the Republican Vice-Presidential nominee in

the forthcoming American Presidential election with a difference.

Vance's account of his life portrays a childhood born into soul-destroying poverty and parental neglect, but which was to witness a rise to formidable political status. It is truly absorbing. Apart from the fact that the language used is not for the faint-hearted, the facts contained have caused considerable controversy. How much of the criticism is justified is a matter of opinion, but there can be no doubt that Vance is a rare and highly resourceful character.

J.D. grew up in Middletown Ohio of Scots-Irish descent into an Appalachian background. While praising this culture for the value it has placed on loyalty and love of country, he criticises its inherent tendency towards stubborn insularity and pessimism. Working class whites, he claims, are the most pessimistic of Americans which is attributable to much of their ongoing cycle of poverty, claims which unsurprisingly have evoked a strong backlash of opinion. After his parents' divorce, J.D.'s abusive mother, like his grandparents, led a life of heavy drinking, drug addiction and serial relationships as was common in their neighbourhood. His grandparents, however, reconciled and thereafter led a stable lifestyle, becoming guardians to J.D. and his sister. "Papaw" and "Mamaw" as the children called them had a redeeming influence on both children. Moreover, Papaw had a firm belief in education and a strong desire to see young J.D. succeed in life. As a result, J.D. was determined to break away from his mother's uncontrolled violence and her general toxic influence. His first break came when he gained acceptance at Middleton High School and from then on,

he became increasingly aware of another world other than that of his Hillbilly background whose passive acceptance of low aspiration and welfare dependancy he was convinced was the root cause of much poverty and despair.

J.D.s relentless criticisms have not gone unchallenged. While the book reached the top of the New York Times bestseller list for August 2016 and been highly praised, other critics have described it as "the year's most provocative", "generalising too much from personal upbringing and for endorsing policies used to gut the poor". However, there seems to have been no limits to J.D.'s desire to put early humiliations behind him although he readily admits that he is still continually haunted by his past. After leaving High School, J.D. went on to serve as a noncombatant in the U.S. Marine Corps, which was to prove highly beneficial. With keen encouragement from his forceful grandmother, he went on to complete undergraduate studies at Ohio State University gaining a B.A. degree from Yale Law School where he began writing his memoirs. Thus began J.D.'s rise in his political career. This was never straightforward. Frequently J.D. felt estranged from his well-heeled fellow students and associates, forcing him to overcome many obstacles to feel socially acceptable. There were numerous setbacks. He was, however, to benefit greatly from meeting up with a beautiful classmate, Usha, who proved to be a valuable support.

Politically J.D. became increasingly rightwing in his views. While always mindful of the positive elements in his upbringing and his indebtedness to the encouragement of certain family members, he had little sympathy for many of his former neighbours whom he recalled as lazy and dishonest. Writing in 2016 he blames a "cultural movement among the poor which encourages them to cast blame on society and the government." This he feels is largely due to the "rhetoric of modern conservatives". While J.D. wrote as a strong admirer of Barack Obama, his views have continued to be progressively right-wing populist, opposing among other things abortion, same-sex marriage and gun control. He is above all a fervent believer in traditional family values. While formerly opposing Trump, he has since become a strong supporter of him and has been named as Trump's running mate. He is now happily married to Usha with a family and has devoted much time to the study of traumas experienced by abused children (mainly poor) from broken backgrounds throughout the U.S..

Regarding Appalachian culture, I learn from internet sources that despite popular myths and distortions regarding the isolation, temperament and behaviour of its inhabitants, recent sociology studies have since helped to dispel these "uneducated and unrefined stereotypes". Since the publication of his memoirs, J.D. has been criticised for ignoring these studies. He nevertheless praises the strong survival instinct of the Appalachians and their stoicism. His story has been dramatised in a Netflix film.

# GUY BRICKELL: FROM 'SUSSEX SHOWMAN' TO INTREPID TREKKER

When I looked back through articles I have written for this Newsletter in recent years, I was

amazed to see that my interview with local farmer Guy Brickell took place 4 years ago, when Lockdown was well underway.

At that time, Guy was just launching his new brand of pork and beef products called The Sussex Showman, with a view to supplementing his farm's milk production, which had been reinvigorated by a new supply contract with Alsop and Walker for their local cheeses.

The review of my previous discussion with Guy arose when I was alerted to an invitation on Facebook to celebrate with "this old farmer" down at Froghole Farm, as "this old farmer is moving off, he's moving out, he's moving ON!" By the time you read this, his celebration will have happened, and hopefully it was



a "helluva thrash" but the move is yet to come, and the reasons for it are less joyful.

The economy has suffered in general since Lockdown, and the farming life has never been an easy one. For Guy it has been very hard, indeed he says, "like treading water". This has been made the more so, as, in the last five years, his father has died and he has lost several cousins, including one, Steven Moore, late of Rapkyn's Nursery, who died of MND on Christmas Eve last year. Both his brother and sister have MS and he himself was nearly paralysed by an infection which went into his spine. With his family having just left home too, it is not surprising that he feels something needs to change.

It is thus that Guy has sold his animals and machinery, and he is to set off on 8<sup>th</sup> November this year to undertake his first challenge, a sponsored trek and mountain climb in Cambodia to raise funds for the **Motor Neurone Disease Association** and **the Multiple Sclerosis Trust.** 

So, Guy needs everyone's support for these fantastically worthwhile causes, which are really in need of funds for research to find cures for these horribly debilitating diseases.



# STUDENTS FROM LOCAL SCHOOLS SHOW THE WAY ON TACKLING CLIMATE CHANGE

Mayfield Climate Action's (MCA) ideas competition, now in its second year, has triggered fantastic winning ideas from students at Heathfield Community College and Beacon Academy in Crowborough.

Mayfield Climate Action (MCA) has been established to develop and implement a plan combining meaningful, eye-catching local initiatives with effective engagement on the need for urgent system change. The competition set out to tap the talent of local schools in relation to communication and innovation. This year we



have decided to award a Winner's and a Runner-up prize for innovation, given the outstanding quality of entries.

The winner, India, has just entered Year 9 at Heathfield Community College. She has produced a brilliant video full of ambition and novel thinking. Eco Homes lays down a challenge to policymakers at local (and national) level to raise their game in terms of the quality of new housing, from design through to materials, including the use of recycled plastic.

Tessa Younger, one of the judges, comments: "As we address the need for a big housebuilding programme, India's video shines a timely light on the poor quality of a lot of modern development and proposes a range of ways in which we could do so much better for people and the environment."

Caroline Barlow, headteacher, adds: "It is great to see one of our students addressing this issue in such a holistic, eye-opening way."

Jasper, now a Year 8 student at the Beacon Academy in Crowborough, has won a Runnerup prize with a beautifully produced video, showing him sketch ways in which gyms could incorporate dynamos in equipment to generate electricity.

John Murray, also one of the judges, says: "This is a clever idea, neatly expressed and could easily have been a winner in another year."

### Wild About Dark Skies Festival

As we approach the Dark Skies Festival from 28th to 10th November, MCA has been delighted to have a constructive and productive meeting with Mayfield Girls School, (such an important part of the village), about ways in which its light emissions can be reduced. This will take time and must be consistent with the safety of students and staff, but past, present and future steps will be set out in a plan for publication before the end of the year. This will form a key, and much appreciated, part of Mayfield's application to become an International Dark Sky Community. Full details will be shared with registered ticketholders a few days beforehand. The Festival proper will be marked in Mayfield by a talk on 'Why Dark Skies Matter' at Mayfield Girls School at 7pm on Monday 4th November. The speaker is Dan Oakley, an expert in the field, who led the South Downs National Park's successful application to become an International Dark Skies Reserve. Dan will explain why dark skies are more than just an aesthetic consideration, having a very real impact on animal, plant and human health. # Launch Of Community Lost Habitats Map

Wadhurst Park has launched an exciting new tool to help the local community rediscover lost habitats and find grant funding to restore them. The free online map covers the whole Upper Rother River catchment, overlaying present-day satellite imagery with historic maps to highlight 110 miles of lost hedges, 620 acres of lost woodland, 113 acres of lost orchards and 200 lost ponds. These are landscape features that our ancestors and predecessors managed for up to 800 years before government subsidies and market pressures encouraged their removal in the last century. The tool enables today's farmers and land managers to easily find out how their own land has changed, and to consider whether they could restore historic features. A key element is being able to click on a lost hedge or woodland and be directed to the public and private grants available to support putting them back. # **GCSE Results**

We were delighted over the summer to celebrate an impressive set of GCSE results, with 25% of grades at grade 9, the School's best performance by this measure since the numerical grading system was introduced, excluding the Covid affected years.

grade 8 or 9 across 16 subjects. Two girls were amongst the top performers in the country in Ceramics, gaining full marks and a commendation from the exam board.

Mia achieved six grade 9s and four grade 8s, and outside of the classroom, was selected for the London Pulse Super league U15 Netball Long Squad and represented Kent at Netball. As a sports and art scholar I have been able to pursue my hobbies simultaneously with my academic studies due to the dedicated mentors that Mayfield has provided."

# **MAYFIELD FIRE STATION**

Letter from the Parish Council

At the September Parish Council meeting it was agreed to send the letter below to East Sussex Fire Authority to object to their proposed closure of our on-call Fire Station.

"We write to you as a Parish Council to express our concern with the current consultation regarding the potential plans to close the Mayfield Fire and Rescue Services Station.

Primarily we feel that the information provided has not been clear and, in several cases, not even correct. As pointed out by a local resident, the number of local listed buildings was wrong, there have also been questions on the availability of statistics, and costs etc. The fact that the consultation events have taken place during the school holidays will have restricted the availability to attend for many.

We feel that the process has not been fair and that the decision to close the station has already been made, the consultation being merely a PR exercise.

We do appreciate that you have budget restraints, and it must be extremely difficult providing an effective service with less money each year, but we ask that you look again at possible alternatives.

The Mayfield Fire and Rescue Services Station is an important part of the community, the firefighters are everpresent in the Parish, regularly attending village events and hosting fundraising exercises like the charity car wash which has become very popular.

More importantly they are a great comfort to the Parishioners; people know that if needed they are on our doorstep and ready to endanger themselves to protect us. We know that the station has been unstaffed of late but rather than simply closing it could you not look at better recruitment practices? As you said, this is a nationwide issue and there must be other viable options.

# MAYFIELD COMMUNITY & HEALTH CENTRE

The project to build Mayfield's combined new Community and Health Centre has now moved into what is called RIBA stage 3, which means that although the overall design and appearance remain the same as presented to the Village at the 7th July Information Event, aspects such as heating and ventilation, power supplies and lighting are being developed in greater detail.

Despite our hopes for an earlier submission, the planning application is now expected to be submitted by 10<sup>th</sup>

October in order to be considered at the Wealden District Council Planning Committee North meeting in February 2025.

The Public Works Loan Board has reconfirmed the loan of £2.3M for the Community Centre but has advised that it has to be drawn down by mid-July 2025. This, however, broadly aligns with when we expect to have to pay our share of the construction costs.

Applications for grants to support the project continue to be pursued and a submission to the National Lottery funding has successfully passed through the initial stage of assessment. We expect to be informed of the outcome within the next 4-8 weeks.

The later planning application submission will inevitably slightly delay the placement of the building contract for the construction project although the construction period is still predicted to be around 11 months. An expected completion date of the end of February 2026 is therefore predicted. However, all efforts are being aimed at bringing this date forward.

# MAYFIELD EVENING W.I.

At our September meeting we were treated to a fascinating talk by Michael Wachter, an experienced outdoorsman, hunter, fisher, forager and primitive skills practitioner, who is on the staff at Great Dixter Garden. He began his talk with some examples of common herbs and native plants which can be used to enhance our diets and promote wellbeing. These included nettles, St. John's wort, hogweed and berries such as hawthorn. elderberry and sea buckthorn. We were amazed at his skill in living off the land, not only by hunting and foraging, but also by making his own clothes from deerskin, bowls and utensils from wood, 'stone age glue' from tree resin, spinning yarn from nettles and making ropes and fishing line by twisting plant material. Michael is passing on his foraging and outdoor skills through lectures and courses, in the hope of halting the ongoing loss of countryside knowledge.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday, October 8th. This is our Film Night and will be held at Five Ashes Village Hall, 7pm for 7.15pm. There will be choc-ices! We will be showing 'Hidden Figures', the story of three brilliant African-American women working at NASA in the 1960s. They were the brains behind astronaut John Glenn's launch into orbit.

**Wednesday, 30th October** 7.15pm for 8pm (collection of subs)

Pevensey Castle - James Dickinson - This talk introduces and tells of the great characters associated with the castle's history, such as King John and Simon de Montfort, whose actions so influenced the story of this country. Pevensey Castle lies on the south coast of England between Bexhill-on-Sea and Pevensey. It is an intriguing place to begin a look at English medieval history as, in one sense, this is where it all started. In 1066 William of Normandy landed at Pevensey.

Known to the Romans as Anderitum, the fort appears to have been the base for a fleet called the Classis Anderidaensis. The reasons for its construction are unclear; long thought to have been part of a Roman defensive system to guard the British and Gallic coasts against Saxon pirates, it has more recently been suggested that Anderitum and the other Saxon Shore forts were built by a usurper in an ultimately unsuccessful attempt to prevent Rome from reimposing its control over Britain.

Key events: Built by Romans (c. 290), massacre of 491, reoccupied by Normans (1066), First Siege of Pevensey (1088), Second Siege of Pevensey (1147), slighted (c. 1216), Third Siege of Pevensey (1264–65), Fourth Siege of Pevensey (1399), abandoned (16th century), state ownership (1925), reoccupied by Allies (1940–45).

**Wednesday, 27<sup>th</sup> November** - "Folk Songs from Sussex" & Dutch Supper – Mak Norman

It is fair to say that of all the counties in England, it is Sussex that appears to have drawn the greatest attention from folk song collectors over a period of some 130 years.

Anyone can play a part in keeping our English traditional musical heritage alive, and learning a couple of songs is a good place to start. There is no right way to sing them but listening to the precious recordings available to us of the old country singers is certainly the place to start. After all, it was their music, handed down, often orally, through the generations with little or no outside influence. Their approach to the songs was every bit as natural as their Sussex accents. Today, traditional songs and music can be heard regularly in Sussex with folk clubs or smaller sessions at established venues in many towns including Lewes, Brighton, Eastbourne, Arundel, Horsham, Worthing and Chichester.

# ENERGY EXPO, FIVE ASHES VILLAGE HALL - COME AND MEET "EDDI" Sunday October $6^{th}$ , 10.30am

Five years ago, the Village Hall committee introduced a number of energy-saving measures into the building with a view to overall cost reduction for the running of the building as well as reducing the overall demand of the energy required to run it. The opportunity arose to incorporate a number of technologies into the redevelopment of the building after the successful bid to the National Lottery. The most recent investment was the installation of further solar panels to complement the existing ones and battery storage to make use of stored energy to offset some of the demand required to run the building overnight. As part of the new installation an "Eddi" was installed which monitored production from the panels and diverted some of this to the immersion heater to provide hot water for the building. The Hall will be open to anyone who wishes to come and view the various energy saving and generation systems we have in place. There will be a short formal introduction to our strategy in The Ash Hall followed by the opportunity to view the equipment and talk to Energy advisers afterwards. Please come along and take the opportunity to hear about the potential for your own situation. We will be featuring :- Air source heat pumps; Solar panels; Battery storage; Energy Diverter; Led Lighting; Underfloor heating; Motion sensors. **Geoff Gregory**

# NEWS FROM NUS GHANI, M.P. FOR SUSSEX WEALD

This time of year brings us many celebrations of harvest and I am always pleased to support 'Back British Farming Day', which is an annual campaign to recognise the crucial role our farmers play in producing food for the nation and caring for the countryside. Sussex Weald is home to many exceptional family farms that are the lifeblood of our rural economy and



produce some of the best British products enjoyed in the UK, as well as overseas. I regularly meet with members of the National Farmers' Union (NFU) and their Next Generation Forum, to hear their views on the future of farming and agriculture, food and energy security, and the importance of buying local produce.

Having made representations to our local supermarket branches to stock and promote more locally sourced products, I was pleased that, earlier in the year, more national supermarket chains have launched 'Best of British' sections on their websites, supporting customers in becoming more aware of British options when online shopping.

However, our farmers are not only keeping the nation fed but are also doing a huge amount of work in managing the local environment, helping our communities to better understand agriculture and where our food comes from, and also enabling educational experiences. The Countryside Alliance Awards, also known as the Rural Oscars, are the annual celebration of the diversity in British farming, and, for the past two years Sussex Weald has been shining in the Rural Enterprise category. Smiles Sensory and Family Farm in Eridge have scooped up the trophy this year. They are the home to nearly 50 rescued or re-homed animals and offer interactive opportunities for individuals with learning difficulties and mental health challenges. I was proud to visit the farm and congratulate the whole team on this success, as well as thank them for making a positive difference to so many children and their parents. I will always champion our fantastic farmers, and I continue working closely with the NFU to support and advocate for them and their work.


### WADHURST BOWLS CLUB

# **Temporary Road Closure Warnings:**

There have been no notices of temporary road closures sent to the office during the last month but the following are still relevant to the Parish.

The B2100 Wadhurst Road / Best Beech Hill / Mayfield Lane, Mark Cross/ Wadhurst road closure has changed dates from 24<sup>th</sup> July to 3<sup>rd</sup> March 2025.

Froghole Lane: Information provided at the time of writing this article is that there is a provisional agreement to allow East Sussex Highways to carry out culvert upgrade works to take place from 30<sup>th</sup>

September to 8<sup>th</sup> November (up to 40 days). This will be dependent on further details being finalised for the permit and permit conditions. At this stage, they are unable to

of the public receiving phone calls from people claiming to be the Police. Remember, they will NEVER ask for your bank details, or for you to make any kind of payment to them. If you receive a call from the 'police', they advise you to follow these steps:

- · Take the details of the person calling you.
- · Advise that you will call back by phoning 999 to verify that you are in fact talking to the police (a genuine caller would never question this).
- · Wait five minutes or use a different phone to call 999. (Fraudsters are able to keep the line open, so that when you dial 999, the call goes back to them instead.) Please share this information with friends and family anyone can be a victim to fraud.
