UP AND DOWN THE HIGH STREET

SEW INSPIRED THREE YEARS ON

It is three years since Nicola Johns opened 'Sew Inspired' at the end of the High Street. Talking to her about achievements, innovations and progress made, it seemed the shop should be called 'Sew Much More'. As well as offering a wide range of fabrics, wools, threads, needles etc., it provides a centre of activity, fun and learning for all ages and acts as a warm hub for those who may be struggling to keep warm in the winter months. At the other end of the age spectrum, she has started a children's sewing club which runs on a Tuesday from 4-6.30

and has capacity for 8 children, and the youngest is only 5. Health and Safety is key and all the children learn how to use a sewing machine and scissors safely. resulting in the creation of a lined tote bag complete with zip and button holes. Nicola is also in the process of developing a monthly miniature club where items for a doll's house will be made, including miniature teddies, sewing boxes, knitting needles and furniture for a six-room doll's house. She was inspired by an entry at the Horticultural Show which she had sponsored, from Idske who had made a 12 scale miniature William Morris rug and will be sharing her expertise at the club.

Full-time attendance at school is not for everyone and for many reasons a small number of pupils are educated at home. Over the last eighteen months Nichola has been supporting a pupil to create a textiles portfolio which has won her a place on an Art Foundation Course in Brighton. The work has covered every type of sewing and has been underpinned by historical and artistic context. This major achievement is



hopefully not a 'one off' as Nichola is now working with another home educated pupil on her portfolio development.

All this is in addition to classes and groups that have been running since the shop started in November 2021. The Yarners still meet on a Monday afternoon; Get to Know your Sewing Machine has been well attended throughout and if you are a man with an interest in sewing, there is also something for you: Fabric Engineering using an Indoor Power Tool, part of the Secret Gentleman's Sewing Club. Silver Viscount sewing and overlocker machines plus tuition can now be bought through Nicola. She is brimming with new and inclusive ideas, which has not gone unrecognised as she was nominated for the Fast Sussex Woman of the Year which is an event where everyone nominated is a winner and recognises women for what they have done for their communities.

Sew Inspired will be open on 29th November as part of the Mayfield Late Night Christmas Shopping event. Information about the courses and other services will be available as well as a warm welcome. Hopefully, you will be "Sew Inspired".

SUSSEX WILDLIFE TRUST

I'm scrambling through the woodland undergrowth, anxious, sweating and clutching a 2kg pouch of white powder and a spoon. I may look like some Colombian cocaine smuggler but I've got the perfect excuse for the police: "I'm researching my parish magazine article". I've been writing articles for Sussex parish magazines for many years and I've received some lovely comments from many people - thank you. It's nice to know they are being read and enjoyed.



When I was a kid, I would read loads of wildlife books with names like 'The Amateur Naturalist' (not to be confused with 'The Amateur Naturist', a mistake you only make once). Each book promised to make you a wildlife detective and was filled with tips on tracking mammals in the countryside. Most British mammals are nocturnal and, after centuries of persecution, all of them are understandably rather wary of humans. We hardly ever see them. Yet these invisible animals leave behind tantalising clues which let us know they really exist: droppings, nibbled nuts, pellets. But the biggest giveaway of all are their footprints.

Primitive mammals (such as Hedgehogs, Stoats, Badgers and you) are plantigrades. We stroll about on the soles of our feet and have five toes. When we run, we use our toes and the balls of our feet. For the mammals who spend a lot of time running and jumping this basic mammalian plantigrade foot has evolved and adapted over time. Some animals have lost a toe (foxes, cats, dogs, hares) while the real gymnasts, such as deer, leap around on two toes, and horses race on just one toe enclosed in a hoof. Like Sherlock Holmes with a foot fetish, you can examine each footprint's formula of toes, claws and pads to deduce just who has been sneaking around at night.

My books told me that, once you find a footprint, the best way to capture it is to make a cast - which explains why I'm crouched here in the undergrowth excitedly mixing up plaster of Paris powder and pouring it into a footprint in the muddy woodland floor. I've always wanted to do this since I was a kid but, well, I guess life got in the way. Now, sitting proudly on my desk, I have my first footprint cast: a Badger (with five toes, a wide pad and obvious claws). And somewhere out there is a Badger completely unaware that its footprint has created a deeper enjoyment of wildlife and inspired someone to preserve it. Which now I think about it, is all I have hoped for from these articles too. I hope



I've made an impression. Wishing you all a Merry Christmas and best wishes for 2025.

MAYFIELD POST OFFICE

By the time you read this Newsletter, the Post Office should be open in the High Street again!

Jo and Holly will be back behind the counter not just for postal services but for all your everyday banking needs: you can pay in cash and cheques, withdraw money and check your balance – everything you used to have to go to your bank to do. We will progressively expand the range of services we offer, not just other financial services but also collect & return, travel money and insurance, and Government services such as passport check & send and DVLA and Council Tax payments. And we will be stocking all the other goods you would expect at a post office: stationery, pens, paperclips, rubber bands, glue, sellotape, string, wrapping paper, cards...... Tell us what you want and we'll get it.

A massive thank you to everyone one who has bought shares or made donations so far. You have made this possible. We still need your support for continuing funding to make sure we stay open and you can now get a copy of the Fundraising Document from the Post Office.

This is your Post Office, owned by the community, run by the community, for the community. Please use it.

"What does the Post Office mean to you?" We thought it might be helpful in support of the new Post Office to ask a range of local people what they missed and what they find useful about having a Post Office in Mayfield High Street. Thanks to everyone who provided comments.

Paul Amans

'For me I don't use it much. Eve used it more for sending parcels and posting letters etc. I did use it for cash and I really miss cash, I now have to go to Cross in Hand or Jarvis Brook, it was handy. I wouldn't do without it and I am going to contribute to the running of it as I think it is essential.'

'The Post Office definitely has an impact as small businesses in the village need as much help as possible and

the Post Office is one of the most important places that everyone needs. I need it for change for pens; I need it for everything basically. As I am next door I also benefit when there are queues as there often are, people will come in for a drink while they are waiting. So it works very well for me.'

Stephen and Susan Moir

'I use it as I am the Treasurer of the choral society and we get subs and I have to pay them in, which is fantastic, now I have to keep the cash and do a transfer from my own account.'

'Will the Post Office be a shop as well? I think it needs a good selection of envelopes, tape and packaging materials, they used to have those plastic bag things to send parcels, I used to use those for the



kids, it needs to be all that as well. It's also very social with great conversations in the queue.'

'Everybody was so friendly, you knew when you went to the Post Office that there would always be a laugh as well as the valuable service they would give you. I really miss the banking and I find trying to get stamps difficult as you have to queue so much at other post offices.'

lan Parker

'Personally I think its essential to the community and the village and the Parish. It's a service for the elderly and infirm, they are the people who need it most and I think it's the lifeblood of our High Street. We are lucky to have a vibrant High Street and if it doesn't open it will affect all the other businesses. All the time it's not here we all go elsewhere to use the services and shops of other towns and villages which makes things even harder than it is anyway here in Mayfield.'

'From an elderly point of view, it is vitally important. Sooner or later I won't be able to drive and I can walk up there; if I can't drive I won't be able to go. We need it, I think it's a right'

'I'm relatively new to the village but during the pandemic it showed its real value, it was like a gem of the village. Everyone went to the Post Office and and chatted and people in the queue would talk to each other, there was a real sense of community.'

'When the Post Office closed I felt heartbroken for everyone living in the village, including myself. It is a treasure and is absolutely key and there are many people who can't just get in the car to another village or town and for those that do it can be a big and stressful trip with parking etc. I feel joyous at the news that the Post Office will be opening again.'

HISTORY OF MAYFIELD POSTAL SERVICE

The first mention of a Mayfield letter is in 1260 when the Pope wrote giving permission for its foundation. The same messenger from Rome probably also carried news of the canonisation of St. Richard, Patron Saint of Sussex.

Eminent figures always wrote letters, usually delivered by their specially commissioned messengers. In the 1590s Henry Neville wrote letters from the Old Palace about the guns he made. In the

1750s Thomas Turner, East Hoathly merchant, regularly used John Streeter, the Mayfield postman, to deliver his goods and cash across Sussex. He detailed news of the Arundel postman who almost lost his life in the snow. Vicar Roger Challice wrote about the new turnpikes in the 1760s, a system which improved communications considerably, and the mail coach became commonplace. Challice often visited his parishioners and found that they were not at home, an indication of the difficulties of communication.

In 1840 Edward Tench moved into the Middle House. He worked in London for the Stamps and Taxes Office, which in 1849 had merged with the Excise to become the Inland Revenue. Tench was involved in one of the many Victorian reforms, this time of the postal service. His office had been responsible for the production and sale of the new postage stamps; in 1841 the Penny Red had replaced the Penny Black. This allowed for the development of a national postal service network. John Eldridge wrote in 1904 "The Mayfield postman's task was to walk from Uckfield to Mayfield. His arrival was announced at 9am by a vigorous blowing of a horn. The letters were then quickly delivered in the village by the postman but not in the surrounding neighbourhood. At five o'clock in the afternoon the same postman took his departure for Uckfield, the horn again sounded."

The railway from Lewes to Uckfield had opened in 1858 which changed the scale of mail deliveries. When the nuns came to the Convent school in the Old Palace in the mid-1860s, Mayfield's postwoman had her nose put out of joint. The nuns' correspondence for Mayfield exceeded the capacity of the postwoman's apron.



"Will they always want the wheelbarrow?" she inquired. "It will be the killing of me if they do."

The first evidence of a Post Office in Mayfield is in a photograph celebrating Victoria's Jubilee in 1897. It shows the shop on the north side of the High Street (which the Osteopath now occupies), Postmistress, Mrs Grace Richardson, and Postman George Unstid (who also worked as a wheelwright) stand proudly outside in their Sunday best. A number of Victorian post boxes still exist in the area, for instance at the top of East Street near the Rose and Crown. Further down East Street was another Post Office and there was a third in Five Ashes; both these were in operation within living memory.

The main Post Office site in Mayfield has changed frequently over the last century, usually in the High Street. The current location of the main post box dates from when the Office was located in what is now the Wine Shop. Services changed over the years. For instance, in 1949-50 letters from the main post box were dispatched to London at 10am and delivered on the same day. In 2004 the second delivery of the day was cancelled. The national structure of the Post Office has often changed, most recently in 2012 when Post Office Counters was separated from Royal Mail, a process which contributed to the Post Office scandal. Debate about the social service element of the network and the core activities of banking and servicing online shopping still continues.

MAYFIELD COMMUNITY & HEALTH CENTRE

We have been working hard to progress the project through regular meetings with the contractor and our partner Wealden District Council (WDC). We all recognise that this is an important building which will serve our community for many years to come.

It is a complex project with many factors to consider, however the fundamental difference between this and the previous project is that we are doing a lot more preplanning work to ensure we reduce the issues that may impact timely construction. The project is approaching the end of RIBA stage 3, which means that the basic design has been completed sufficiently so that a final costing exercise can be undertaken by the contractor. Costings have been sought from a selection of subcontractors and various further value engineering options have also been investigated. This is an opportunity to look at ways we can reduce expenditure without affecting the building and so the contractor is looking at numerous options but it is taking longer than we'd hoped.

With this in mind, we have taken the decision to hold back the planning application originally forecast for November whilst finalising stage 3 costs.

Meetings are being scheduled with WDC and Baxall Construction to finalise the options.

Whilst this is frustrating the Project Board has agreed it is the best way to proceed.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

A Merry Christmas and a Peaceful New Year to all residents of Mayfield and Five Ashes. 2025/26 Precept

At its meeting on 11th November 2024 the Parish Council approved the 2025/26 budgets and voted for the precept to remain unchanged with no increase next financial year. However, it is anticipated that it will most likely have to be increased the following year as costs are rising quite considerably.

Within the budget came the approval of the following grants payable in 2025/26: Mayfield Bonfire Society - £500 Five Ashes Village Hall - £500 Mayfield Band - £500 Kent Sussex & Surrey Air Ambulance £500

Wealden Citizen Advice - £500

TBW District Samaritans - £250

In addition to the above, annual grants of £150 are paid to each of the primary schools. Other contributions that have been approved in the budget are annual contributions of £5,250 to MAYFACS, £1,050 for the Bonfire Society towards next year's Bonfire Festival and £1,250 to the Parochial Church Council towards graveyard maintenance.

All your wrapping paper and cards (except foil/glitter) can be placed in the recycling bin. Recycle your real tree in your Garden Waste Bin. (See information on The Mayfieldians recycling service in this Newsletter.)

Community Speed Watch

There is a newly formed Community Speed Watch for the Parish comprised of local residents who have kindly volunteered their time to take the training courses and to carry our speed checks. At the time of writing this article there had been two sessions in Five Ashes and one in Mayfield. There have been a surprising number of offenders caught speeding in excess of the speed limits.

Children's Roundabout At Court Meadow

Following the antisocial behaviour and fire damage, the central area of the children's roundabout has been made safe so no fibreglass splinters can harm little fingers. The delay in repairs is due to trying to locate spare parts. Unfortunately, it these

are now obsolete so the plan will be to get the whole piece of equipment replaced. An insurance claim will be made to assist with the funding as the costs will be significant.

Booking System Consultation -Household Waste Recycling Sites

East Sussex County Council (ESCC) is seeking views on proposals to introduce a booking system at household waste recycling sites across the county. The proposals are part of the authority's work to identify areas where savings can be made to address an expected £55 million funding gap next year.

The consultation runs for eight weeks, closing on Sunday, December 22nd 2024.

ESCC informs that the move could reduce queuing at sites, help save as much £50,000 a year and ensure only residents' waste is being disposed.

They also inform experience of neighbouring County Councils is that booking systems have provided a range of benefits to residents, including:

less queuing, particularly at sites that can get very busy; less traffic at and around the Household Waste Recycling Site (HWRSs), because customers take their waste in bulk and visit less often; reduced crowding within the HWRSs; less disruption to customers as site servicing can be planned around customer demand; residents have been able to plan their time more effectively with the certainty of a booking and less chance of getting caught in a queue; a deterrent to traders who try to tip business waste for free at our sites - a cost unfortunately passed on to the taxpayer / resident; allows staff to concentrate more on managing the site and less on managing queuing traffic.

Newsletter readers should consider whether would like to see this introduced or whether they would prefer the convenience to be able to continue to visit household recycling sites spontaneously. The consultation will run for eight weeks, closing on Sunday, December 22nd. For more information:

Roadworks Information - A267 Argos Hill And B2101 Bicycle Arms Road, Rotherfield

Balfour Beatty will be carrying out drainage investigation works on the A267 Argos Hill and B2101 Bicycle Arms Road. The works will be carried out on Monday 9th December 2024 to Thursday 12th December 2024 between 9am and 4pm.

The work involves CCTV surveys of the underground drainage system so they will also be using high pressured water to clear the pipework.

The team will start work outside property 'Gables Cottage' and continue approximately 500 metres South to outside property 'Green Ridge'. They will also be working from the junction with Argos Hill and Bicycle Arms Road. The roads will remain open with temporary traffic signals in place whilst the work is undertaken.

All of these works are subject to favourable weather conditions, for example heavy rain may affect the progress of the works. Also, it can be a noisy process and there may be flashing lights and reversing sirens.

Wealden Community Grants Programme

As mentioned last month, the Wealden Community Grants Programme has launched to fund services and activities supporting residents living in the district.

Organisations and community groups across the Wealden district are being invited to apply for grants, which have been made available through Wealden District Council's budget and supports the priorities within the new Wealden District Council Strategy. The council is asking not-for-profit organisations, such as charities, community and voluntary groups, community interest companies and more to apply. Organisations will need 50% match funding, which can include in-kind and/or cash match funding. The deadline for applications is 4th December 2024. For more information visit:
