SUSSEX WILDLIFE TRUST

Flying Colours

Let's get the smug bit out of the way. This January I visited an incredible bird watching and conservation organisation in the Western Ghats, India, run by highly skilled and welcoming environmentalists, spotting 75 remarkable bird species, many endemic to this region. #sorrynotsorry.

A notable feature of these tropical species is their astonishing colour palette; vivid reds, brilliant pinks, and intense greens. There are a few reasons behind plumage colour. Bold colours can be flaunted as a display tactic in males to impress females and shame rivals in competition for a mate or territory. Colour can be used as a camouflage and survival technique, whether blending into surroundings, or by confusing predators with reflective iridescence.

A fellow Brit commented on how our birds don't really compare when it comes to colour, but there are some spectacular species to prove them wrong. Back in Sussex, spring is just starting to peep in; the season where we finally experience those explosions of colour after such a long wait. Aside from an excuse to show off about my grey-escape holiday, I thought a celebration of our most colourful birds was due.

Firstly, Kingfishers. They also reside in India, but they're too bright and beautiful to not make the cut. A wetland and reedbed regular, these fabulous fishers take blue to another level. There's no mistaking their tiny turquoise shimmer as they dart down a watercourse, or perch stock still on a branch, ripple-peering.

A regular on feeders, Blue Tits can be overlooked. Take a moment to appreciate that lemon and azure plumage, merging with navy and tinged with green. Once another common garden staple, Bullfinches are sadly now a rare treat to see. If you spot a male, peachy-coral chest set against muted hues of grey and black, it can't be anything else.





wowing crowds with their aerial acrobatics in murmuration, you could be forgiven for thinking Starlings individually are somewhat ordinary. Think again. Up close, and in the right light, Starlings are a mass of beautiful iridescent purples, greens and golden yellows.

Corvids are considered a little plain, but what about an emerald Magpie tail or the sapphire flash of a Jay feather? A Jackdaw's pale iris can seem



blue against dark feathers, and sometimes, in low summer sun, jet-black Rook plumage can look purple.

Who needs a Malabar Trogon or a Flame-throated Bulbul? Not me! Well... not for 11 months of the year anyway.

SUE DICKINSON: MASTERMIND BEHIND SEEDY SATURDAY

In the cold and dark months of winter we all need a boost, an injection of fun, friendship and purpose. These things were all present in abundance at the second local Seedy Saturday which took place in the Scout Hut on Saturday 1st February and was organised by Sue Dickinson. She has lived in Piccadilly Lane with her husband and her mum, for thirteen years. Early on, despite enjoying gardening, she didn't have time to join the Mayfield Horticultural



Society (MHS) as she was working in technology in the holiday industry but on taking a career break to care for her mum, she became a member and was soon asked by Tessa Crowe to join the committee. Sue suggested a Seed Swap and before she knew it, was tasked with organising this community event put on by MHS. Seedy Saturday is a term that was created by a Canadian organisation, Seeds of Diversity back in the 1980s. It came to this country when a couple of holidaymakers from Brighton attended one in Canada and on their return, started up Seedy Sunday in their hometown. Having lived in Brighton previously, Sue knew of the event and was determined to get it going in Mayfield. She admitted to feeling some anxiety before but was overwhelmed by people's enthusiasm and generosity. She contacted big seed companies who donated seeds of all types, mainly those near their sow by date, but still perfectly

viable and this gave it the momentum it needed. This year seeds came from Chiltern Seeds, Moles Seeds, Thompson and Morgan, Suttons, Plant World Seeds, Sarah Raven and many more including our local gardening communities including Rapkyn's Nursery. Morag Hockin from Rapkyn's who was helping on the morning, said how she loves to imagine all the seeds on the table growing in a garden, full of colour and beauty.

On arriving at Seedy Saturday I was amazed by the vibrant buzz in the Scout Hut which was crowded with people of all ages including lots of children. Sue stressed the importance of it appealing to the younger generation; what better time to develop an enthusiasm and understanding about how things grow? Drinks and biscuits were provided free for children to keep their energy levels up while choosing seeds, entering the raffle and looking at Critters Corner run by Sue's

sister Jane from Devon alongside Sue Lancaster and Becky Morris. Children are our future gardeners and in the time of climate change may well need expert growing skills and will also benefit from the pure joy that can be had from working the soil and seeing the results of one's labour. Critters Corner is an area for our young people to explore seeds, the plants they become and their relationship with the critters and the natural world. It's also where the annual tallest sunflower growing

competition is launched with free seeds, growing guides and a trophy to keep for the Sunflower Champion 2025. The Summer Show schedule has entry details. Seeds for tasty things to grow and eat that appeal to our youngest gardeners were also on offer. Last, but not least, there were takeaway goody bags with some insects and butterflies to build and decorate plus something to carry their seeds home in. Many grandparents were also given some to share with their grandchildren.

The event was laid out with flower seeds



down one side of a long trestle table and veg seeds on the other, the wild flower




seeds, which were exceptionally popular, were in pots at one end of the hall with many varieties nearly out of stock by the time I looked at them. These are harvested from the garden of a local lady who wanted to remain anonymous and sorted into ice cream tubs supplied by her husband who has an enduring love of ice cream. The idea was for people to choose the packets that they wanted to grow and make a donation to the Mayfield Horticultural Society; the proceeds are a welcome contribution to the costs of running this thriving local organisation. For those people who were just starting out on their gardening journey or those who needed an update, Tessa ran several demonstrations on how to grow seeds successfully and how to 'pot on' to gain positive results. She shared so many useful tips and it seems we don't need to grow huge trays of seeds which result in 1000 baby carrots with the subsequent waste, but can use much smaller dishes and even recycle the tubs from supermarkets. She also advocated using proper seed compost and covering the seeds with horticultural grit which stops fungal growth, prevents weeds and keeps the moisture in so reducing the need to water. What's not to like?

There was a mouth-watering cake stall run by Jackie Coghill and Viv Izzard who had made many of the cakes including the beautifully iced and exceedingly large and delicious looking specimen which was being raffled alongside the general raffle with a good range of prizes. The cakes could either be taken home or eaten as an accompaniment to a cup of tea or coffee which was provided by members of MHS with Helen Laine, Claire and Robert Montagu running the café. While families were enjoying their refreshments I managed to ask what they thought of the event: James Rowland who attended with his wife and two young children said: "It's a lovely event which really gets the community together. The best thing being that gardening knowledge can be passed down through the generations". Emma, mother of Evie and Oscar said: "All of us have been inspired by what's available. The kids are now keen to get on with gardening and it's great being able to ask for advice". Sue and Tessa managed to publicise the event widely and were on Radio Sussex "Dig It" which seemed to work well as there appeared to be lots of people from further afield. Sue is keen that next year Seedy Saturday will go from strength to strength with even more attending from local villages and towns; there are so many seeds to go round you don't need to bring any but they are always welcome and there is such fun to be had.

THE WORLD OF THE FORSYTES - by John Fisher published1975

How many of us senior citizens can fail to remember the enormous popularity in the late 1960s of the brilliant television drama "The Forsyte Saga"? How can we forget,



whether we followed it or not, how the nation was utterly gripped on Sunday evenings by this phenomenal production? Perhaps to some at the time and since, it may well have seemed ironic that the Forsytes should have been so popular, alien as their world was to that of the Swinging Sixties. Yet popular they were, not only here but in other countries, even behind the Iron Curtain. What was their secret? I recently read John Fisher's book published soon after the Saga had been televised several times on BBC 1 and 2 which gives a fascinating insight into the world in which this upper middle class English family lived. John Galsworthy published this work which contains six novels in 1930 and which reflects the world into which he himself was born and bred. Fisher's book is highly readable, beautifully illustrated and covers many aspects of the England of 1886 until the mid-1920s, aspects which may or not have affected different Forsyte generations who while fictional were so typical of their era and status. What were their chief characteristics? Perhaps this is best summed up by young Jolyon who replied when asked how if there were "hundreds of them" they could be identified, replied: "By their sense of property. A Forsyte takes a practical - one might say a common-sense view of things....based fundamentally on a sense of property. A Forsyte never gives himself away". Jolyon went on to add that "It's their wealth and security that makes everything possible; art, literature, science, even religion, even though they believe in none of these things." Then again "They are the middlemen, the pillars of society, the cornerstones of convention, everything that is admirable". So late Victorian! How curious this drama should have held such apparent fascination for television viewers in so-liberated, hedonistic late-1960s. Was it nostalgia for a more staid society which had now become such a thing of the past? Yet in their own times, the world of the Forsytes was changing around them and part of the fascination of this saga is seeing how these generations dealt with, successfully or not, the enormous vicissitudes taking place in the outer world and in their homes. Moreover, this being a family drama viewers can so readily identify situations so often prevailing in their lives. Add to this the heady mix of fierce loyalties, betrayals, inner conflicts as well as marital breakdown and tragedy. Topped of course with glamour: Nyree Dawn Porter was tailor-made, cast as the seductive Irene while Eric Porter was equally unsurpassable in his role as the uncharismatic Soames. There have of course been other dramatisations of the Forsytes on television, as well as in film, stage and frequently radio. As early as 1920 the Forsytes were filmed on silent screen while in the U.S. Errol Flynn, Walter Pigeon and Greer Garson acted in a 1949 film version. In the U.K. the last television series in 2002 starred Damien Lewis as Soames and Gina McKee as Irene; this, unlike the 1967 version, was in colour. While the producer of the 1967 serial regretted that he just missed being able by a few years to produce his own work in colour, I feel that somehow viewing it in black and white today brings it a little closer to its own age. The Saga reflects the huge turbulences of the early 20th century, wrought by the Great War and finally featuring the 1926 General Strike. Some of the older actors in 1967 might well have had their own early memories of these times which could have had a bearing on their performance which I felt was not present in the 2002 serial, excellent as Lewis and McKee generally are in screen appearances. On its own Fisher's book is an illuminating read. Cynthia M. Baker

Kia Orana! Our sisters in The Cook Islands welcome us!







VILLAGE PEOPLE

LORRAINE CHAPMAN: A MAYFIELD GIRL THROUGH AND THROUGH

I would guess there are few in Mayfield and Five Ashes who can claim to have been born in one of our villages and spent their whole life here too, but Lorraine is one of those few, and, unusual though it is in this day and age, from what I know of her, it has done her no harm at all. Indeed, not only was she born in Dunstan's Croft, in Mayfield 1937 but her father, Jack Finch, was born in Mayfield too, at Argos Hill. He was employed as a carpenter with one of the local builders, and there are still pieces of his woodwork around Mayfield, including the Parish Council noticeboard near the bus stop. Her mother Thelma, a well-known scion of the Mayfield Afternoon W.I., and latterly the evening one, was Welsh but had come to Mayfield early in her life, to work in domestic service in the larger houses in the area. She met and married Lorraine's father in St. Dunstan's Church and lived in Mayfield for the rest of her life.

Both father and daughter went to Mayfield School, as it was then known, (the Convent at that time going by the name of St. Leonard's, Mayfield.) This is what we now know as Mayfield Primary School but as secondary education was only available on a very limited basis in the U.K. at that time, he would have finished his schooling there aged 15. Lorraine was however fortunate to move on to the newly built Heathfield School at 13, where she spent 'two marvellous years', having specific teachers for each subject, and where a male teacher took the boys for P.E. and a female one the girls.

Choosing to remain in Mayfield when she left school, being somewhat shy and retiring, she went to work serving customers for Collins and Gray, Gentlemen's and Ladies' Outfitters, who were to be found in what is now Sew Inspired, a shop which has seen several incarnations prior to its current use. She worked happily there for 11 years and says that providing an individual service for the customers was good for her confidence, being so "shy and silly". It was during that time that she married her husband, Les, in St. Dunstan's. He was also born in the village, she had been at school with him, and she only left the shop when she had their children, Jane and Priscilla, who were both brought up in Mayfield too, christened in the Church and sang in the Church choir.



After leaving school Les, at 16, was called up for National Service and went into the Royal Marines where he spent 5 years. She says that he actually spent most of his time playing cricket, as the war was now over, but the school was still very proud of him, especially when he performed at the Royal Tournament at Earls Court in honour of the Queen's Coronation in 1953. So much so that the headmaster commissioned a coach to take the pupils to London for it, and pinched Thelma's binoculars to watch the whole show, much to her annoyance.

Looking back over her life in Mayfield, Lorraine is very much aware of how times have changed and, in some ways, possibly not for the better. Mayfield High Street has altered somewhat, in that she remembers when there was a "full kit of tradesmen" so that you could get everything you wanted without leaving the village. That is possibly not quite so true now, but she does acknowledge that for a relatively small village, Mayfield does still "punch above its weight".

Nevertheless, when she and Les were raising their family, it did have 3 builders, including Harris and Pipers, Parkers the electricians and Nappers the hardware store, next to which Les had opened a tiny Barber's shop, having trained in Barbering after leaving the Marines. To the left of his shop was Cornford's the Grocers, which would be roughly where the House Café is now, and across the road, there was Grinham's the Grocer, which occupied the current Middle House Deli. Mr. Grinham, a former Churchwarden of longstanding, lived in London House and accessed the shop through a door and down some steps in the back corner of the front room adjoining the shop. It is known as the Grinham Room to this day.

Smith and Homewood, Greengrocers were to be found on the stretch of the High Street between London House and what was then Bucks newsagents. Mr. Smith used to grow all the fruit and vegetables himself in the village and Mr. Homewood would sell it, wrapping all customers' purchases with utmost care.

There were also 2 sweet shops, including Fenner's, which even I remember, where the schoolchildren used to crowd in after school, to choose their gobstoppers and mint humbugs from the tall glass jars which lined the walls.

I was also surprised to learn that the old Post Office, which is now occupied by Mayfield Wines, was a tailor's shop, and the tailors used to sit cross-legged in the window doing their tailoring and mending.

For Lorraine, what remains a constant for her is Mayfield's Women's Institute of which she has been a long-standing and revered member, as was her mother, Thelma.

The original Mayfield Afternoon W.I. began in the late 1800s, and when the Evening W.I., which Lorraine joined in 1963, began, the two operated in tandem until the Afternoon one closed for lack of members, in the last decade or so.

The W.I. is where Lorraine has gained the most confidence, especially when taking on the responsibility of staging the W.I. Marquee for the County at the Ardingly Show, 2 years running. Having done a week's course in Staging, which involves the display of W.I. skills and talents, and with her sales experience at Collins and Gray, she was volunteered for the role by the former late great President, Berenice Blurton. Though it was a very demanding job which took over 6 months to plan each time, she is proud of her achievements and not a little surprised at how well she did.

Living alone in Mayfield for the last 26 years, since the untimely death of Les, Lorraine is well settled in the centre of the village, supported by her friends from W.I. and the Church community, of which she is a staunch supporter and a formidable organiser of the cake stall at any Church market or fair. She sees her daughters often and loves to hear about the progress of her 21-year-old grandson, who has just joined the RAF. Life is quiet and uncomplicated and though she may not have travelled the world, she has seen enough to know that there could be a lot worse places to enjoy her retirement than the village in which she has spent her life these last 88 years. Here's to continued health and happiness in the future Lorraine!

MAYFIELD COMMUNITY & HEALTH CENTRE

Wealden District Council's (WDC's) online Planning Cases register has now closed for public comment relating to the new Mayfield Community and Health Centre planning application.

At the time of writing, over 150 responses from Mayfield & Five Ashes residents had been received by WDC, and like with previous public consultations, feedback has been overwhelmingly in support of the project.

In parallel with the planning activity, the project has entered into what is known as RIBA Stage 4, which is an intensive phase involving the specification of every imaginable detail

of the building, both internally and externally, with all the documentation being scheduled for finalisation by the end of March.

The outcome of the planning application is expected to follow WDC's Planning Committee North meeting in the latter part of March 2025. Providing the application is successful, the 'Design & Build' stage contractor appointed for the project will then invite the sub-contractors involved in the various specification packages to submit formal competitive quotations.

At the same time, any building conditions stipulated as part of planning approval by WDC will be dealt with. These processes will allow the final project cost to be ascertained.

Assuming the schedule remains on course and the quotations are acceptable, the project's Building Contractor will be appointed. Mobilisation requires approximately a month, which should permit building work to commence in mid-July 2025.

We will however keep you updated via the Newsletter, village Facebook and the Mayfield and Five Ashes Parish Council website www.mayfieldfiveashes.org.uk.

Our monthly talk in March is given by Martin Heard, an art historian with a career that has also included publishing and IT. He has worked in Continental Europe and North America, and now he has retired he spends his time sharing his enthusiasms with "every type of audience".

Tulipmania was a period of economic speculation in the Netherlands and was considered one of the first examples of an economic bubble and crash in history.

The 1630s was a decade in which the middle and upper classes wanted to display their wealth with extravagant gardens. Rare tulip bulbs, that were fragile and took years to grow from seed, could cost up to six times an average salary, and houses were mortgaged to buy them, often just as a commodity to resell at a profit rather than to merely adorn their grounds.

The bubble burst in 1637, leaving many people ruined. However, there are conflicting opinions on whether the crash wreaked havoc on the Dutch economy, or whether it was a relatively small and short-lived market for a very beautiful luxury.

Non U3A visitors are very welcome to our talks, for a small fee of £3.00, but of course our members are free. ST. DUNSTAN'S SUNDAY CLUB

Everything we do is related to the reading so that when we are in church anything that is said is familiar for the youngsters. At the end of the service, providing we have some confident ones, a

couple of children will go to the front and tell/show the adults what we have been doing. The adults love this because often they are made to laugh by the young ones. Not all the youngsters are confident on their own but will often go up with someone who is. There are always 2 adults on duty and we are all DBS checked. Any child is welcome and if necessary, parents are very welcome to stay too until their child gains confidence to stay on their own while the parents go into church. Youngsters are welcome to arrive from 10am for start at 10.15am. We are a small group but a happy group.



His face is ubiquitous becoming his brand, dark piercing eyes, his prolific career as an important artist spans 8 decades, his enthusiastic involvement in modernism, in all of the confused and confusing artistic trends of the 20th century, trends he often led, his equal facility in painting, sculpture, pottery and ceramics are that of a true Renaissance man.

But disturbingly, the complexity of his many, many, often damaging, relationships with women as muses, models,



lovers and wives all had deep influences on his work. As often as he cast aside his lovers his art changed equally radically, a great artist but an honourable man....?

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Migration To Gov.Uk Emails And Website

Towards the end of last year, the Council resolved to migrate to a gov.uk website and Councillor email addresses. The .gov.uk domain is recognised and trusted by the public as it signifies that the website is an official government site. This can increase confidence in the information and services provided, by reassuring users that the site is sanctioned by the Government. Using a standardised domain format across all Government websites promotes uniformity and makes it easier for residents to navigate and find official resources.

The community website is now active and residents using the old website address will be automatically redirected to the new address: https://mayfieldfiveashespc.gov.uk

Councillors are in the process of updating their email settings. Any emails sent to the old addresses ending in org.uk will automatically be forwarded to their new ones. Both email addresses will run concurrently while everyone gets used to the new ones. Therefore, please update any contacts you may have to ensure that Council email correspondence ends with @mayfieldfiveashes-pc.gov.uk after the relevant Councillor's name.

Devolution

In February, Deputy Prime Minister (DPM), the Rt. Hon. Angela Rayner, made an announcement in the House of Commons that Sussex will be one of the places on the Devolution Priority Programme and that the Government will be moving to consult on the formation of a strategic

combined authority and elected mayor. Below is the joint statement:

> "Greater powers for Sussex come a step closer with government backing for devolution

An opportunity to gain new powers and investment for Sussex has moved a step nearer with the vernment's agreement to make the area

government's agreement to make the area a priority for devolution.

Following an expression of interest from the leaders of Brighton & Hove City Council, East Sussex County Council and West Sussex County Council, ministers have approved proposals to create a mayoral strategic authority for Sussex, made up of an elected mayor and two members of each constituent authority, with strategic powers for transport, public safety, health, environment and climate change, housing, economic growth, skills and jobs.

As well as unlocking new powers and investment for the region, it would give the people of Sussex a stronger voice in how national decisions affect them and enable more decisions to be taken locally.

The Government will now begin a consultation to seek the views of people and organisations in Sussex.

All three of Sussex's upper-tier local authorities – Brighton & Hove City Council, East Sussex County Council and West Sussex County Council – agree that devolution could unlock new funding and give people a stronger voice over national decisions which affect them and greater power to steer major projects across the area.

It follows the Government's White Paper on English Devolution published in December which outlined its aim to bring more decision-making down from Westminster to local communities.

Cllr Paul Marshall, Leader of West Sussex County Council, said: ""This is fantastic news for the whole of Sussex and West Sussex in particular. A mayoral authority will give our communities greater influence in the big decisions that affect the region, such as our highways, housing, and economic growth, plus much-needed long-term financial stability.

"I'm pleased the Government has accepted us on to its priority programme, meaning we can unlock these benefits sooner rather than later. There is much to do, but please be assured we will continue our focus on delivering essential services and putting the needs of our residents first."

Cllr Keith Glazier, Leader of East Sussex County Council said: "I believe this is excellent news for the people of Sussex because it's an opportunity for more decisions to be made locally and for greater investment here. I'm pleased the Government has recognised our potential to prosper and develop together."

Cllr Bella Sankey, Leader of Brighton & Hove City Council, said: "This is an historic and exciting moment for our region. I am optimistic and ambitious about devolution because of the direct benefits I know it will bring to all communities in Sussex. It will mean that more money is directly invested in our area and that better transport, affordable housing and skills and job creation can be accelerated.

"I'm looking forward to meeting with residents, businesses and partners to ensure that all of our communities have the opportunity to shape the future."

Local councils in every part of Sussex would work closely with the mayoral

strategic authority and would continue to deliver day-to-day services.

Alongside devolution, the Government is asking for proposals for unitary councils in all parts of Sussex, moving away from the two-tier model of county and borough or district councils where those exist. Discussion with partners will continue on how this might be arranged.

There are no immediate changes to the operation of local authorities in Sussex or the services they provide."

The Mayoral elections are anticipated to take place in 2026. It is not known what implications there will be for Town and Parish Councils or any financial consequences.

Extra Appointments for Urgent Dental Care

The NHS in Sussex is expanding access to urgent dental care appointments, following the success of a pilot programme last year. More appointments are being made available across Sussex, including Eastbourne, Hastings, Lewes, Rother, and Wealden.

The initiative will provide same-day urgent care appointments and offer courses of treatment, reducing the need for recurring visits.

Sports Infrastructure Funding Available To Improve Outdoor Sports Facilities

Applications are invited for the Sports Infrastructure Fund programme recently launched by Wealden District Council to enhance and provide outdoor sports pitches and facilities throughout the district.

The Council has committed £200,000 per year over a three-year period to organisations via a grant funding programme, to support the delivery of recommendations in Wealden's Playing Pitch and Outdoor Sports Facilities Strategy. These recommendations have been agreed with sports-governing bodies and Sport England. Funding can be used to improve amenities and pitches throughout the district.

Applications are being invited from local sports clubs, town and parish councils, schools and community organisations to support the delivery of a range of projects. The outdoor sports that could benefit from the funding programme include football, rugby union, tennis, cricket, lawn bowls, hockey, netball and stoolball.
