





WELCOME FROM THE EDITORS



COMING SOON!

Mayfield and Five Ashes Newsletter is going "online". We are pleased to announce that our website will go live on Monday 2nd June. This will allow us to enable two very important developments:

Regular subscribers who have an email address and a credit or debit card will be able to register and renew their subscriptions with a few simple clicks. You will also be

able to choose 'autorenew' meaning next year's subscription just needs a click to confirm. Our current system requires you to pay by BACS or standing order and it works but occasionally there are errors! The new system will be safe and secure and reduce our workload.

We will have an online electronic version of the Newsletter with page turning as if you were reading a printed copy. All paying subscribers will have access to this new service, and we are also making it available for those who only want an electronic version at a cost of £12 per annum. Many readers have asked us for such a version, so we hope you will take it up. If you register on our website for a postal subscription at a cost of £25, the electronic version will be also available to you free.

Those subscribers due to renew in June will receive an email with full instructions as to how to sign up, and we will do the same each subsequent month.

If you want to take out a new subscription – either just electronic or for a printed copy delivered to you each month, you can do so from 2^{nd} June. The cost of the printed copy is still, after nearly 5 years, only **£25 per annum**. Full instructions on how to sign up will be included in our June edition.

Printed copies will still be available to pick up from the many outlets in the villages. If you don't have an email address and don't use the internet, you will still be able to send a cheque in the post for your subscription, enclosing your name and full postal address.

Finally, if you have already set up a standing order for your Newsletter subscription, you can continue with this if you wish, although it will help us as volunteers if we have almost everyone on the automatic system. We don't want anyone to miss out on having access but if you don't register for the website and pay by card you won't get access to the electronic version.

We feel very proud of the Newsletter, which we work hard to produce each month and proud to bring you this latest development. However, the Newsletter is nothing without the contributions that many make to our articles, the advertisers, without whom we would not be able to bring you something so good and so inexpensive, and you, our readers. So please give this innovation a try from Monday 2nd June if you can and let us know what you think.

WOODHILL SURGERY

We are delighted to learn that planning permission has now been granted for our new surgery at Court Meadow!

This is a huge milestone for the future of GP services in Mayfield and Five Ashes. Since taking over the Practice in 2013, our patient list has grown from 2,200 to nearly 3,800 and our current premises are no longer able to meet that level of demand. The new surgery will provide us with 350 square metres of clinical space, in line with national standards, compared with just 80 square metres today. The Court Meadow site is the only location we have found that truly meets the needs of our growing Practice and the wider community. We are incredibly grateful that Wealden District Council has committed to funding the building, with the GP Partners and NHS Sussex signing a 25-year lease. This is a clear sign of our shared commitment to local healthcare. We are also very pleased that the new surgery will be located alongside a proposed new Community Centre, led by Mayfield and Five Ashes Parish Council. This shared vision presents an exciting opportunity to create a vibrant hub at the heart of our village, bringing together both healthcare and community services.

We would like to express our grateful thanks to the Parish Council for their ongoing support and leadership on this initiative and in helping to shape a brighter future for everyone in the community.

Back in 2022, we wrote to all our patients as part of our engagement process, and we were truly heartened to receive 96% positive feedback in support of the plans. Your encouragement has helped drive this forward, and we cannot thank you enough. This is a vital and exciting development, not just for the Practice, but for the whole community and we will keep you updated

with progress and key milestones as the project moves ahead.

CLASSICAL STARDOM

On Sunday 4th May at 7.30pm in St. Dunstan's, Mayfield Festival Choir directed by Jeremy Summerly with the Ripieno Players and soloists from the Royal College of Music will be performing the all-time classic Mozart's Requiem with his Exsultate jubilate and Haydn's Little Organ Mass.

Jeremy writes: Mozart's iconic Requiem is justly famous. Not only does it contain some of Mozart's most scintillating music, but it was left unfinished at his early death at the age of 35. Why and for whom the Requiem was written remains the subject of debate and speculation. In this performance by Mayfield Festival Choir, conducted by Jeremy Summerly (in the completion by Mozart's younger contemporary Franz Süssmayr), the brilliant Ripieno Players and young vocal scholars from the Royal College of Music are joined by Soprano Sofia Kirwan-Baez, all of whom have become regular features of musicmaking in Mayfield. Sofia's ravishing tone and dramatic approach will shine not only in Mozart's Requiem, but also in Exsultate, jubilate, a brilliant virtuoso motet written in Italy when Mozart was killing time at the end of an operatic run in Milan; if you were a teenager in 1773 - and in the anachronistic absence of TikTok - you presumably needed something to while



away the hours while you were waiting for the evening performances of your most recent opera.

Mozart's dazzling music is heard alongside that of Haydn, the other star of Classicalera composition. Haydn's 'Little Organ' Mass is a sparkling miniature designed to entertain as much as to provide music for church worship. The name 'Little Organ' Mass is a reference to the glittering Benedictus, where the organ comes to the fore (here played by Andrew Benians) to accompany Soprano soloist, Diva Kirwan-Baez. MAYFIELD COMMUNITY & HEALTH CENTRE

We are very pleased to announce that Councillors voted in favour of the new Mayfield Community and Health Centre planning application at Wealden District Council's (WDC) Planning Committee North 10th April 2025 meeting. The MCC committee would like to thank all those who have supported the project and the speakers who addressed the planning committee formally at the meeting, including representatives from both MAYFACS and Woodhill Surgery.

This welcome news means that we can now press forward with the important task of demolishing the old Hall and building the new combined Centre, along with the associated landscaping and parking areas.

Despite increasing building costs since the previous 2022 approved submission, the new Hall and Health Centre have been re-designed in line with the revised budget. Now that RIBA Stage 4 of the project (the detailed specification of requirements) has been completed, the various sub-contractor work packages are being obtained. The final project cost is therefore expected in early May 2025 after which it will be considered by Mayfield & Five Ashes Parish Council .

This is a joint project involving funding for the Hall by the Parish Council, with the Health Centre element being funded by Wealden District Council. It will provide an up-to-date community space in the heart of the village combined, with a fit-for-purpose, state-of-theart facility housing the GP Practice. It will be sustainably built, incorporating materials, such as brick and sandstone, to reflect the local environment.

We hope that the main contractor will be appointed, with the contract in place, in June, which will allow for construction work to commence around mid-July 2025. The contractor has already liaised with the local schools about the implications for traffic flow during the construction phase. The remaining contents of the old Memorial Hall are to be removed by the end of May, in readiness for demolition in late June this summer.

The legal documentation, which comprises a Development/Funding Agreement and Head Lease for the Surgery, are also nearing completion. If the schedule goes according to plan, completion is anticipated in mid-2026.

MAYFIELD EVENING W.I.

At our April meeting we had a captivating talk by Robin Keyte about 'The Amsterdam', a 260-year-old Dutch East India Company cargo ship, which was wrecked off the south coast at Bulverhythe beach near Hastings. The ship lies remarkably intact, including its cargo of silver ingots. It remains hidden from view except during very low tides when the timbers become exposed and the shape of the vessel becomes visible. Some of the findings from the site are in The Shipwreck Museum in Hastings and a replica of the ship is on display in Amsterdam.

We also had a visit from Jo Eates, our village Postmaster, who gave us an update on how the new Post Office is running. Our Post Office is a unique institution, as it is owned and run by Mayfield Community Benefit Society, which is, in its turn, owned and run by our community. The Society earns commission on each transaction so the more we use the Post Office the more money it makes. We were all encouraged to continue to use the services as much as possible, in order to keep this valuable asset on our High Street.

We will be having a cake stall at the Mayfair on May 10th with the usual array of lovely W.I. cakes on sale. We look forward to seeing you there!

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday May 13th. This will be our AGM and will also feature a talk by Gill Halcro on the Secret Operations Executive (Churchill's Secret Army): a fascinating insight into our country's recent history.

We meet every second Tuesday of the month (apart from August) at 7.15pm for 7.30pm at Colkins Mill Church, just at the end of the High Street.

John Lentaigne


On 17th March 2025, the death at the age of 105 of the last surviving Battle of Britain pilot, John 'Paddy' Hemingway, was announced. His squadron shot down 90 enemy aircraft during an eleven-day period in May 1940. Prince William's tribute on social media said, "We owe so much to Paddy and his generation for our freedoms today. Their bravery and sacrifice will always be remembered."

Thinking of the bravery shown eighty years ago, those of you who have visited East Grinstead Museum may well know the name Mollie Lentaigne. Mollie was a Red Cross voluntary aid detachment nurse at the Queen Victoria Hospital but then also became a medical artist from 1941 to 1945, assisting Sir Archibald McIndoe by

producing drawings of remarkable accuracy to record the surgical procedures and often experimental operations that he was undertaking. This was an extremely intense and exacting form of historical and medical reportage, where she was required to work very fast. She would use pencil to create the drawing but would then add ink and colour to some of her work afterwards. Subsequently Mollie's drawings were then published in McIndoe's articles and books and the Museum is the custodian of several hundred of these unique drawings.

What is not so well-known about the Lentaigne family is that Mollie had a brother, John Wilfred O'Neill Lentaigne, who became a second lieutenant in the Rifle Brigade 1st Bn (Prince Consort's Own, Service No.186295). It is thought that John was born at Rangoon, Burma, where some of his Lentaigne relations lived. Mollie and John's parents were Lt Col Edward Charles Lentaigne, of the 4th Gurkha Rifles (son of Benjamin Plunkett Lentaigne and Elizabeth Monica Coffey) and Cecilia Mary Bunbury (daughter of Colonel Charles Thomas Bunbury and Lady Harriot Emily Dundas). The Lentaignes were married in London on 30th April 1919 and John was born in 1922, with Mollie having been born in May 1920. John was then amongst a large group of Second Lieutenants commissioned from the Officer Cadet Training Units, who were given Emergency Commissions effective from 10th May 1941. John would have been 19 years old.

Little is then known of John until his death is recorded in the Supplement to the London Gazette, (dated 13th August 1942), where it was announced that he was killed



in action near El Alamein on 25th July 1942. His record on the Commonwealth War Graves Commission website shows he is buried and/or commemorated at the El Alamein War Cemetery, Egypt.

John was just 20 years old when he died. However, not only was he killed in action at such a young age but he was also awarded the Military Cross, which is only awarded for an act or acts of exemplary gallantry during active operations against the enemy.



For those with an interest in local history, John's name is recorded on the War Memorial at Uckfield Parish Church, East Sussex; the brass memorial has 92 names for World War 1 alongside their regiment and rank, and a carved wooden board records 44 names (with initials only) for World War 2.

Whether 20 years old, or 105, we will do well to remember their bravery.

NATIONAL GARDENS SCHEME

Hoopers Farm (TN20 6BD) will be open for the National Garden Scheme (NGS) on Saturday 14th and Sunday 15th June between 11am and 5pm. Tickets cost £6 and can be bought at the gate or booked online at ngs.org.uk.

This is a large south-facing garden with wide ranging views. It is tucked away at the bottom of Vale Road. The garden features many roses, including a rose arbour and an abundance of island beds packed with early summer flowering herbaceous plants, annuals and shrubs. There is a productive vegetable plot, a rock garden and a lawn area which has been repurposed to create a wildflower meadow with meandering grass paths. There is also a long meadow walk to a wild-life pond and, as always, two friendly donkeys!

Homemade teas will be provided by the very efficient Pre-School team and lovely plants from Rapkyn's Nursery will be on sale. There will be live music on the afternoon of Sunday 15th.

Also open in June, after a long break, is the superb garden at Tidebrook Manor, Sunday 1st June, 11am – 4.30pm. See more details of this garden and many others in the Sussex County booklet, available at local shops, cafes and garden centres.

This month, we come together to commemorate the 80th Anniversary of Victory in Europe Day and pay our respects to those who fought in the Second World War. A series of events will take place locally in Sussex Weald and across the United Kingdom to mark this momentous occasion in our country's history and bind us together in a moment of reflection, celebration and remembrance of those who served and sacrificed defending the values of our great nation.

Our British Armed Forces are the ultimate defenders of our security and freedom. They are respected the world over and I always convey our gratitude when spending time with local residents whose family members worked with our Armed Forces overseas. I'm proud to have been working with the local branches of the Roval British Legion for many years and it is always an honour to stand with local veterans on Remembrance Sunday and meet those who serve our country at home or abroad today. Given the county's proximity to Europe. East Sussex has often been on the front line of war. As a result. many of our towns and villages across Sussex Weald have had a long connection to the military.

ONE OF MAYFIELD'S IRONMEN STRIKES AGAIN

As if swimming 3.8 kilometres in open water (this is like swimming from Wales to Bristol), cycling 180k (like cycling from Bristol to London) and then running a marathon of 42.2k., all done consecutively and completed within 17 hours wasn't enough, one of Mayfield's Ironmen, three of whom were interviewed for this Newsletter in January 2024, Matt Botterman, has decided to attempt to swim from England to France during the first week of July. The English Channel is a 21mile stretch of cold, tidal water and is one of the busiest shipping routes in the world. Swimming it is widely considered the Mount Everest of the swimming world and far more people have actually reached the top of the mountain than have competed the swim!

Matt spoke to Newsletter Co-Editor Jeanette recently about his latest challenge, saying: "Under the channel swimming regulations I am not allowed to touch the boat, anything that floats or anybody during the swim. The regulations also state that no wetsuits are allowed for this swim - it's a Speedo, a thin rubber hat and a set of goggles! The water is likely to be 15-16C in July. To put that into context, your local indoor pool is likely to around 25-28C. In short, it's going to be cold!

Fewer than 4000 people have ever completed the swim solo but I hope to make it in 12-13 hours before hopping back onto the fishing boat that will escort me during the

swim, and head back to Blighty for some fish and chips! I am doing this for a fantastic local children's charity, **Taylor Made Dreams**. If you Google "**Matt Botterman Just Giving**" you will find my page."

We will keep you up-to-date with Matt's training. Please do help spur him on by donating to this very worthwhile local charity. Good luck Matt.

FINDING OUT WHAT PARAGON IN FIVE ASHES HAS TO OFFER

"Some people don't know they want a Porsche until they come in here and fall in love with one"

When I walked into the Paragon showroom in Five Ashes in early April, I was warmly greeted by George Gibb in Porsche Sales, who I quickly discovered had been born and brought up in Mayfield, went to the Primary School, and now, at age 26, lives here too. Some regular readers might think that there is a recurring theme in this and my last 2 articles about residents who are true 'Mayfieldians', and yes, it is does look like that, but in this case, George is part of a much bigger story.

Not having been in the market for a Porsche, I was surprised to learn that Paragon is an independent specialist dealer in used, mainly 2-door, Porsche sports cars. It is not a Porsche main dealer, the nearest one being in Tonbridge, and it does not sell new or electric cars, or big SUVs. The only 4-door car it will deal with is the Macan, a sporty lightweight 4-seater SUV.

Paragon specialises in buying used Porsche sports cars, mainly from existing customers, who bring their cars in to be serviced, or from a network of contacts owning Porsches, who are known to the team at Paragon or from whom they have bought cars in the past. They are very selective in what they buy and will only purchase cars outright so that they can be prepared and sold on. They deal with about 150 cars a year (compared with main dealer sales of 750), prepare all cars to the same high standard in each case and do not sell to the mass market. Their market is largely in the UK and Europe, but they do export to Australia too where right-hand drive cars are driven. There is little export to the US for that same reason, and there is likely to be even less in the future due to the current economic situation.

George has been with Paragon for 3 years. He is part of a staff team of 13 and his main role apart from sales, is to focus on the company's external communications and social media presence, organising videos, photoshoots, some of which happen in and around

Mayfield and Five Ashes (always with Paragon cars) and podcasts which often feature on YouTube and Spotify. He was brought in to make Paragon accessible to that part of the younger generation who are making a lot of money, for example as social media influencers, on TikTok and dealing in bitcoin. It seems he has been very successful

All members of the team (some of whom have been with Paragon for 20 or even 30 years), whilst having a specific role in either selling, servicing, communications or finance and administration, can, and are encouraged to, get involved in all aspects of the business, to the extent that they all get to know each other's customers who, in many cases, are regarded as friends of the Paragon 'family'. Customers, who may often already have a Porsche from there, often drop in for a chat and are never turned away. Indeed, one is made so welcome, as I was, that I am surprised the staff get any work done at all!

It is great customer relations built on trust and good communication. Some regular customers will buy without even seeing the car before it arrives, duly prepared, in the showroom, such is the confidence they have that the team will provide what they want. Others may come in for an MOT and a chat and leave with yet another Porsche for their collection!

The team is led by Mark Sumpter, the owner, who bought the VW Garage and local shop in 1993, having worked for DBS Ford in Jarvis Brook. As a Porsche owner, he knew where he wanted to be and saw the garage as a way to become independent and follow the dream. With little money and in the wake of a recession, but with passion and energy, he built the business up and his dream has now become a reality, one he can justifiably be proud of.

The secret is to provide an overall high-quality service, a cut above that delivered by other Porsche dealers; a holistic experience which, because of the modern-day pressures of the car industry, those dealers cannot now provide. Paragon is in the rare position of having the time, and, because of astute financial management, the money, to look after and care for their cars and their customers in a style redolent of the 80s. As an example, it is not unusual for a staff member to travel some distance to pick up or deliver a Porsche to the customer, as part of the all-round service which Paragon provides.



Many customers will also travel long distances to visit Paragon, even from as far afield as Scotland and the Continent, and many of them are collectors, a passion Mark shares and understands. He has been known to sell a Carrera GT for over £1m, which is almost exceptional. Such cars would be bought and sold on commission, because they would not have needed attention, having been held as part of a collection and never driven. Having a mileage below 1000 is very critical. He has even bought and sold the same car 3 times over, but each time going to a different collection.

Mark's own Porsche collection includes some old racing cars and Paragon has a team which races at a semi-professional level. Mark is the main driver, taking part in 10 races every year on Grand Prix tracks all around Europe, including Silverstone and Spa in Germany. He has also raced at Daytona in Florida.

The team has won 5 championships including the British GT, the Porsche Club Championship and the 2 Litre Cup, which involves 1965 Porsche 911s racing against Ferraris and Aston Martins at Le Mans. Last year Mark also raced an ex-Le Mans 911 GT2 in the Endurance Racing Legends. Originally, he used to race relatively current cars, but now the team only race historic ones.

In addition to being out there on the racetrack, Paragon has good contacts with Driver Tuition on and off the track, whose specialists can be hired by customer groups to provide Advanced Road driving courses for the day. Paragon also likes to keep in contact with customers by holding Car and Coffee events, hosting breakfasts and running charity events, at Goodwood for instance. The staff are also keen to be involved in the local community, and Five Ashes readers may recall the Quiz/Charity

Night, which was held not so long ago to raise money for a defibrillator, when residents were invited to attend and look around the showroom.

So, what about buying a Porsche? When you walk into the showroom, every model looks good as new, and the assumption must be for most that there will not be much change out of £50,000 at the very least. Yet apparently, you could pick up a Boxster, admittedly 20 years old, for £15,000! Boxsters are the baby of the Porsche range, but as Mark says, they are still a Porsche made to the same high standards as any other in the range and can cost anything between £60,000 and £160,000 new. The 911 is the 'flagship' and is the same shape as when it was first made in 1964.

Porsche cars 'age gracefully' and Porsche 'drip feed the market' to keep residual values high. Some appreciate more than others, but at 20 or 25 years of age, any Porsche will rise significantly in value. They are also less expensive to insure than you might think, and they are fitted with trackers to deter theft. Mark told me 'The brand has a lot of love out there', and, if you think about it, you do see them around much more now

Like me you may not be in the market for a Porsche, even a used one, or at least I didn't think I was until I went in and met the Paragon Team, but it was a great experience to look around the showroom to see and hear what is happening there. So why not pay Paragon a visit? You can be assured of a warm welcome and, who knows, you might just fall in love with a Porsche too!

JO ANDREWS & THE REPAIR CAFÉ I met Jo Andrews who organises the Repair Cafe:

'It's been going two and a half years now. Usually, it's in the shed at Merrieweathers every month on the third Saturday and then once a year we take it to Five Ashes Village Hall with a 'go-box' for all we need on the road. We are so lucky that we have a permanent base. The ethos is all about recycling where possible: mending, saving money, saving the environment, be a bit



greener. We're so lucky because we have got some amazing repairers. We've got a gentleman who specialises in clocks. He can do watches, replace batteries for example, but then he can turn his hand to all sorts. Others are generalists but they are super good at what they do. We've got Jeff who does woodwork and he's happy to show people how to do it. In fact, all of

the repairers are really happy to show you how to do it.

What's your role Jo? My skills are making tea and coffee cake, talking to people and the admin including tracking the jobs with a spreadsheet. Originally, new to the village, I wanted to meet people, so I decided to see what it was about - you don't have to bring a repair down to enjoy a cup of coffee or a slice of cake. So, I was talking to them and they said, well come and help us. So that's how I got into it. I track the repairs: you find out what's needed, show it to a repairer and they triage it, they say, yes, we can fix it or no, I'm sorry, we can't. And we are repairers, not restorers.

We don't ask for donations - some people can't afford a donation - but many do and it helps to fund the Shed as a whole. A lot of people really respond if you've managed to fix something. One lady, her son had made her a box when he was at school. He was now grown up and abroad and she'd dropped the box and it had broken! One of our repairers who works with ceramics -she does dolls houses, tiny, tiny things - fixed it for her. When she





came back it looked amazing and that lady was all tears. That's a special moment.

We never know what's coming in - some days it's a clock day and at this time of year, a lot of garden implements may need sharpening, patio cleaners need fixing. We've got somebody who can solder, somebody who can weld, a woodwork expert, ceramics, clocks, mechanics, electricals, sharpening. And if we can't do it (clothing, jewellery) we signpost them to people who can. Some of the favourites we have fixed include a Tibetan telescopic mountain horn that had been converted into a lamp but the lamp holder was broken; an Italian

rocking chair came in - absolutely beautiful; and a mosaic jewellery box made with slivers of tortoiseshell - that was a painstaking job by Idske.

One of my favourites was an ornate metal bird feeder that was looking a bit battered and broken. The lady who brought it in said it was her husband's but he was now in a home with dementia but he'd remember the bird feeder so could we repair it? So, with some welding from Stuart, we fixed it. When she saw it there were tears. And that's often the best thing - the emotional connection for people, you see it in their faces. So come in and see us - plenty of parking, bring your dog and just have a cuppa and a piece of cake if you like. *Thanks Jo that's a great offer!*

SUSSEX WILDLIFE TRUST - CUCKOO: SOUND OF SPRING

It's become a tradition of mine to go camping locally for a few nights in May. Being immersed in nature, spending evenings by firelight, and absorbing the abundant buzz of wildlife, it's a good-for-the-soul time to be outdoors in Sussex.

Hawthorn, or the May tree, is flowering in fragrant blooms. Bats are flitting en-masse from maternity roosts at dusk to forage. Badgers are on the trundle and Foxes on the trot. And yes, there are loads of lovely baby bunnies. In Sussex, we are lucky to retain a population of visiting Nightingales, and on uninterrupted May nights the males are in full rattling, palpitating symphony. Tawny Owls ke-wik and Barn Owls shriek. Woodlands burst into carpets of indigo as Bluebell scent fills the understory.

Amidst this, an undulating 'beep-boop' can be heard, a natural metronome. It is one of our most recognisable bird calls, and the onomatopoeic sound of spring and summer; the Cuckoo.

Arriving from Africa in March, Cuckoos infamously lay their eggs in other birds' nests, sneakily replacing an egg of an unsuspecting parent for them to incubate, feed and fledge. The not-so-little Cuckoo nestling shunts other eggs, and even youngsters, out of



Although their calming calls have accompanied many a spring sundowner for me, I'm still yet to see one myself. Perhaps this year could be my year. Maybe.

WADHURST PARK - FARM AND NATURE RESERVE

It was a glorious April afternoon when I visited Wadhurst Park to interview Harriet Bristow, Head of Community and Operations and Luis Brown, Chief Executive. They have a wealth of knowledge and experience between them and hold a deep interest in the environment and biodiversity, working hard to manage the 2,100 acres, in order 'to protect its nature, wildlife, cultural heritage and beauty'. www.wadhurstpark.co.uk.

Harriet, who is a Geographer and worked at the Department of the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) for 10 years, coordinates the day-to-day running of the Estate. She is responsible for the community programme which includes a range of events and projects. This includes opening the garden as part of the National Gardens Scheme, which takes place this year on Friday 13th and Saturday 14th June, hosting knowledge exchanges with people from other Estates and organisations, such as the National Trust, engagement of children through visits from schools, Brownies, Scouts and Rainbows, the MAYFACS Shed and Community Orchard and a Market Garden

the nest, outcompeting any remaining for resources, becoming the last chonky chick standing. Regularly hoodwinked are Reed Warblers, Dunnocks and Meadow Pipits. Mostly insectivorous, with a penchant for Hairy Caterpillars, adult Cuckoos spend their days feeding prior to their homeward migration. Having not had chicks to rear and fledge, they leave around June, with the new generation following later in summer.

Overall, it sounds like Cuckoos are having a pretty easy time of it. However, as is the story of so many of our native species, they are under threat. Cuckoos have declined by 65% since the 1980s and are now on the UK conservation Red List. The usual suspects are at play of habitat loss, climate change, and pesticide use resulting in food scarcity. Additionally, these issues have befallen many of their host species, leading to similar population declines, or, at the least, Cuckoobewildering behaviour changes such as earlier breeding.

Despite their size and familiarity, these elusive birds are not an easy spot. In a second act of mistaken identity, their barred chest can often resemble that of a Sparrowhawk.



called the Lost Peacock. She is also responsible for courses, some of which are held in conjunction with the Sussex Wildlife Trust e.g. Bird, Butterfly and Dragonfly ID and Bird and Bat watch. If you have always struggled with your wildflower meadow, there is a Scything course which teaches how to manage small meadows through the correct use of the scythe. These courses are for limited numbers but are all advertised on the website and Facebook.

Luis, who studied Environmental Technology and International Development at university, followed by an MA in Land Management, is interested in using technology to map and record what is happening on the Estate. This includes the review of ecological data, which shows how things are doing and shows the progress of regeneration. It is also used for land management, for example, working

out the grazing plan and forestry plan. In the past there were 30 tenant farms on the land now owned by Wadhurst Park, each farm having had a full complement of workers. At present, to cover the same land, there are 4 staff including 1 stockman, 2 full time rangers, I conservation land manager and 2 trainee rangers, so the technological systems mentioned above are invaluable in ensuring that all the work on the estate is dealt with as efficiently as possible. There are also opportunities for traineeships for young people who are keen to develop a career with an environmental focus.

Luis and Harriet showed me a website they are developing, which will show how the habitats including hedgerows, woodland, orchards and ponds on land in the upper Rother valley have changed since the 1870s. www.upperrotherlandscape.co.uk The site consists of four layers, the bottom layer a recent satellite view of the area

onto which is transposed an 1870s Ordnance Survey Map, above which is a colour coded map of lost habitats across the region, and another layer shows the public footpaths. There is also information relating to all aspects of regeneration. It is believed that the area has lost 110 miles of hedgerows, 620 acres of woodland, 113 orchards and 200 ponds. It is possible to focus in on the map to find your local area and to see where the hedgerows, ponds, orchards and woodlands would have existed. Ideally people will be inspired to recreate these features, even in a small way, in their gardens. When walking out in the area it is also possible to spot where habitats might have changed; if for example you see a Wood Anemone or a Bluebell growing in an open field, it is a hint that in an earlier age the field you are walking across was once woodland, as these flowers only traditionally thrive under the canopy. If anyone is inspired by this website and is actively creating a new habitat for the benefit of wildlife, it would be appreciated if they could let Wadhurst Park know, post it on Facebook or mention it to the Newsletter.

The whole ethos of Wadhurst Park is to create and maintain traditional orchards, hay meadows and coppice woods. They never use herbicides, pesticides or fungicides, believing that intensive farming hastens biodiversity collapse. The management of woods is an important part of this system, and the park runs a Coppicing Club where a group of 37 people assist with the annual coppicing, bringing light onto the forest floor and kickstarting a new cycle of life.

The farm has 100 head of Sussex cattle and two kinds of sheep, Hebridean and Wiltshire Horn. Sheep belonging to Charles Fuggle are also grazed periodically throughout the year. Luis and Harriet believe that the habitat is formed by the long-term relationship between the land, the wildlife, grazing animals and human beings who work on the land. Walkers are welcomed on the public and permissive paths but there have been some issues with dogs, which have unfortunately attacked sheep and worried cows. This can all be avoided by owners keeping dogs on leads when near livestock, keeping both the animals and humans safe. It is also preferable that dogs are kept out of ponds and streams, as there is newly emerging evidence that dogs' flea treatments can harm aquatic life and disrupt ecosystems. Walkers may have noticed a certain amount of regeneration work being carried out at Sharnden. This is all being done by Wadhurst Park using traditional materials and methods, for example, lathe and plaster alongside up-to-date technology, such as wood fibre insulation and heat pumps.

It struck me, while writing this piece, how lucky we are to live near such an ecological haven. So thank you Wadhurst Park for all you do for the community and the local wildlife.

MAYFIELD BAPTIST CHAPEL

At Mayfield Baptist Chapel we have continued our study through the letter of James. In Chapter 5 of James, it says "Is any among you afflicted? Let him pray. Is any merry? Let him sing psalms."

In this verse we are instructed that we can come to God through prayer when we face troubling times, but how can we pray? Many are familiar with The Lord's Prayer, found in Matthew Chapter 6. This gives us not a 'prayer to pray', but an example of how to pray. The Lord's Prayer gives us a framework for us to fill.

The opening words "Our Father" show the personal relationship we can have with God, knowing he will listen and care about us as a loving Father does to his Children; "Hallowed be thy name" tells us that God must be approached reverently, because of His holiness. "Thy will be done" reveals that all that we say in prayer must agree with what God wills. "Give us our daily bread", is a request for the things that we need, acknowledging that all we have is because of God's goodness to us, and so we ask for this to continue. "Forgive us" shows to us that we must daily confess our sins before God. We do this because, if we confess our sins, He will forgive us (1 John 1:9). The phrase, "Lead us not into temptation", is because, with our own strength, we will fall into temptation, but with God's strength we can overcome temptation.

However, when we are in a season of happiness, a time of joy, there is another direction in this passage; to "sing Psalms". Psalms and hymns are one way that Christians praise and worship God for His goodness to them. For if we turn to God when we are going through times of trouble, how much more then should we turn to Him, thank Him and praise Him, when things are going well. **Lucy Hill**

HOSPICE IN THE WEALD: SHAPING THE FUTURE OF HOSPICE CARE

We are delighted to let you know that Hospice in the Weald will be embarking on an exciting transformation over the coming year, designed to ensure we can provide the best care now and for years to come.

In Five Ashes, we are looking to again provide in-patient services at Cottage Hospice, as well as opening a new centre for children and young people. In Pembury, we will be refurbishing and upgrading our Hospice.

Nick Farthing, Hospice in the Weald's Chief Executive, said: "This transformation programme will help us continue to provide the compassionate care everyone deserves as they come to the end of their life, in the best possible environment, now and in the future. In the short term, there will be some changes and temporary service relocations, but we are working hard to ensure transitions are as smooth as possible and will keep everyone updated. We expect most of the work to be completed by next summer. We'll then have greater flexibility in what we offer to patients and their loved ones, an even better environment for our wonderful staff and volunteers and be in an even stronger position to support the communities we serve and those who support us."

Services at Cottage Hospice, Five Ashes

The in-patient ward at Cottage Hospice is getting ready to admit patients again, after a temporary pause in admissions. We are expecting to welcome in-patients to Cottage Hospice instead of our Hospice in Pembury in the autumn – this will allow us to carry out necessary refurbishment work in Pembury. Once complete, in-patient care will continue to be offered at both Cottage Hospice and the newly refurbished Hospice in Pembury.

Children And Young People

In addition, we are planning a new children and young people's centre in Five Ashes, to open later next year. We already support children with life-limiting and life-threatening conditions through home visits, outreach services and special events. To further meet families' needs, we are looking to redevelop a property next door to Cottage Hospice to create a place where children can take part in arts and crafts, sensory play and music, and watch films in an accessible cinema room. Although we anticipate this will see only a slight increase in the number of people accessing the Five Ashes site, the scheme will consider how we can add additional parking to make best use of the available space.

A Fresh Look At Pembury

The Hospice in Pembury opened in 1998 and is now in need of refurbishment. The inpatient ward, reception, chaplaincy and spiritual care rooms, and Living Well centre will be given a fresh, new look. They'll be redesigned to provide a calm and uplifting environment. And they will be modernised, so we can offer a greater range of support well into the future. During the refurbishment, in-patients will be cared for at Cottage Hospice in Five Ashes. Some Pembury services will be also temporarily relocated, including Counselling and Support and Living Well services. These will return to Pembury once the refurbishment

is complete, with in-patient care being provided at both sites. We have appointed a specialist company that will, among other things, be responsible for ensuring the building work is carried out efficiently and that contractors are cooperative and considerate throughout. We will provide updates and details of engagement events as plans progress.

Funding

Thanks to funds previously raised and recent government funding, we have money set aside to carry out this project. This means that every pound raised or donated by our generous supporters and charity shop income can continue to go where it is needed most - to deliver our services, to be there for our community, and to raise the next pound. This year, Hospice in the Weald needs to raise £9 million, which is why the continued support of our incredible community has never been more valued. www.hospiceintheweald.org.uk


JAN MERYON 01.04.37 - 16.01.25

Jan led a full life. She loved people. She was resilient in the face of many challenges and generous with her time and skills, working as a counsellor and making everything from patchwork quilts to marmalade and Christmas goodies.

She learned early to cope with adversity when her father was made bankrupt in her early teens, and shortly after her mother fell ill, leaving Jan to bring up her younger sister Tricia.

She took a year out from nursing training to care for her mother, who died when she was 21, before qualifying and becoming a Theatre Sister and then a midwife. Her nursing training led to her making lifelong friends as well as acquiring essential life skills.

She was adventurous, going with a nursing friend on a long trip by car to Gibraltar in the early 1960s, as well as



annual skiing trips. She stood up for her rights, organising a petition of fellow nurses to complain about the bad food given to them by their hospital.

She made her own wedding dress when she got married aged 27. Shortly after, they moved from Sevenoaks to a remote smallholding on the Isle of Islay, where she brought up her sons Marc and Hamish. She became a self-taught potter, and trained as a counsellor, as well as working in the island's CAB and in the dispensary run by the local GP.

Life was hard and lonely, the bad weather unremitting and the landscape bleak. Early on she had to milk a cow twice a day, as well as care for pigs and sheep, and her increasingly difficult and depressed husband.

Whilst she grew to love the big skies and the local community (she remained resolutely proud of her English roots) she recognised that "you can't live on a view", and in her early 60s she moved to Mayfield, close to where she had spent much of her childhood in Kent.

Despite knowing no-one, she threw herself into village life and became very active in numerous groups, including bowls, book club, fundraising for the Hospice, and the Mayfield Festival. She worked as a Verger in the Church for around 20 years and made numerous friends from all walks of life. She enjoyed frequent trips to the theatre and cinema. Mayfield provided one of the happiest periods of her life.

The move south also gave her a chance to see much more of her grandchildren, Rory and Elsa, and she was very proud of them both and their growth into confident young adults.

Although her small cottage didn't have a view, it became a focal point for her busy social life, being well situated in the centre of Mayfield. Her cottage was beautifully furnished, and she was always well turned out, being well-known for her love of red shoes.

During her illness she remained stoic and resilient and was very grateful for the support of her friends and community, who rallied round providing lifts to the hospital and visiting regularly. She was determined to stay in her cottage until the end but eventually accepted that she could be better cared for in Holy Cross Care Home, where she spent her last weeks, receiving numerous visitors. She died there peacefully in mid-January, aged 87.

She made the most of her life and the opportunities it provided. She led an adventurous and full life, overcoming many challenges and making lifelong friends along the way. She was much loved, and she will be sorely missed.



Vandalism And Antisocial **Behaviour** Overnight on Saturday 22nd and

Sunday 23rd March there were a series of acts of vandalism and antisocial behaviour, resulting in thousands of pounds worth of damage. The garden plots in South Street were vandalised, as were a vehicle in Fletching Street, the information kiosk in the High Street, the children's roundabout (again) and the skate park. The cork noticeboard in the information kiosk was ripped off the back and all the leaflets removed and used in a fire in the skate park. A hole was smashed through the centre of the roundabout so it has been removed and the skate park surface is badly damaged, so the area can no longer be used. These mindless acts have been reported to Sussex Police and some information on alleged suspects has been received. We would like to ask residents who live in the vicinity of the South Street car park, Fletching Street and the eastern end of the High Street who might have doorbell cameras to check to see if they have any suspicious activity

Speed Indicating Devices And **Community Speedwatch**

recorded.

Traffic speed is one of the most complained about problems in the Parish. This is a summary of the Traffic Monitoring Report received by the Community Safety and Traffic Committee last month. We now are starting to build up two sources of traffic speed information, the Speed Indicating Devices (SIDs) and Speedwatch

sessions. It is fair to say that the SID data is the more representative as they are

capturing data on a 24/7 basis and are passive devices, whereas Speedwatch sessions have personnel with hi-viz jackets who are pointing a speed gun at the traffic. This does tend to slow them

down!

Speed Indicating Devices Update

This period's data covers January 2025 to 6th April 2025. I think many will be surprised that 93.16% of the vehicles were below 35mph, the speed that would incur a traffic penalty.

Nine sessions have taken place so far, six in Five Ashes and three in Mayfield. 88 vehicles exceeded the allowed limit, out of a total of 2559. They will have received a letter from the police to that effect. If anyone appears on a list twice, they receive another 'reminder' letter and if they appear a third time they are visited by the police and may be cautioned.

Sussex Police Rural Crime Team

Since 2020, Sussex Police's Rural Crime team (RCT) has worked to make positive inroads with the rural community across the county, providing a reassuring presence and dedicated point of contact. The RCT has one unit based in Heathfield. There are always RCT officers working between 8am-midnight. The East Sussex unit currently has one Police Sergeant, six Constables and a few PCSOs. Most of their work takes the form of investigating rural crime reports and supporting their Police colleagues (e.g. response or neighbourhood policing). The RCT has a wealth of knowledge on specific countryside legislation that enables crimes to be dealt with effectively and robustly. The team also carries out proactive engagement by attending country and agricultural shows to offer support and advice to the rural community. The main message is that not every crime in a rural area is a rural crime. The main areas of business for Sussex Police's rural crime team are:

Agriculture

The most common crime is livestock worrying

Support farmers after break-ins/theft of machinery and fuel, advise on future security of property

Investigate damage caused by inappropriate use of quad bikes/off-road vehicles

Support farms and countryside businesses when there are instances of activism or protests on their land (e.g. animal rights)

Wildlife

Illegal hare coursing Poaching

Crimes against protected species

Heritage

Damage to the actual fabric of a listed or historic building (recent examples: Bronze Age burrows damaged, and an Anglo-Saxon cemetery being disturbed) Illegal metal detecting

Equine

Thefts from working stables or equine centres

Theft of horses themselves Instances of animal cruelty are dealt with in partnership with the RSPCA
