BRUSH UP YOUR LIFESAVING SKILLS - MAYFIELD AND FIVE ASHES

Heathfield & Waldron First Responders have kindly agreed to hold two CPR demonstrations, one in Mayfield, one in Five Ashes. As we now have four defibrillators in the Parish, we thought it was important to follow this up with CPR demonstrations. The first one will be held in the Scout Hall, Mayfield on **Tuesday, 23rd April at 8pm** and the

second on **Tuesday, 21st May at 6.30pm** at Five Ashes Village Hall. Each location can hold a maximum of 20 people so please do apply in good time. LOCATION OF DEFIBRILLATORS: **Five Ashes Primary School** - accessible from the pavement; **Woodhill Surgery** - in the entrance porch; **Mayfield Primary School** - on the wall by steps to main entrance; **Telephone Kiosk outside the Rose & Crown**. Defibrillators are housed in weatherproof boxes and are accessible 24/7. Full audio prompts guide you through as soon as you open the lid.

MAYFIELD SHEEP WATCH

Some people may be aware there has been a significant rise in dog attacks on sheep in the Mayfield and Five Ashes area, both since the pandemic and particularly very recently.

Apart from being very distressing or fatal for the sheep and their unborn lambs, this seriously affects the farmer both emotionally and financially and **could result in dogs being shot**, with the person responsible for the dog being prosecuted.

Whilst most dog owners are very responsible and know how to act appropriately, there are sadly some who are not, but also some who are simply unaware of what is expected of them when exercising their pets in the countryside.

Farmers are animal lovers too and do not want to shoot dogs but if the present level of attacks continues it is only a matter of time before someone's beloved pet is killed.

As lambing season is approaching, sheep are carrying unborn lambs and can easily abort them if disturbed. Livestock worrying is a criminal offence and even barking at or "just chasing" sheep is an offence.

In an effort to reduce the rapidly rising trend, a number of local sheep farmers, dog owners, dog trainers and the Police met with a view to producing information for both experienced and inexperienced dog owners. The aim is to produce a series of Q&As as well as leaflets and posters, to illustrate the issues and provide advice on how to prevent these attacks.

The problem is not just dogs being walked but also escaped or "lost" dogs. It can also affect other livestock such as cattle and horses. **If a dog is "lost" it is not under control** and this is also an offence if it causes issues on the highway or with livestock.





which there are sheep. This also applies to other livestock such as cows and horses.

Q2: What should I do if I see an unaccompanied dog in the countryside?

If it is worrying livestock or is loose on a highway and could be a danger to traffic, call the Police on 999. If it is worrying livestock try and take a video and forward that to the Police. If there is no immediate danger to traffic and it is not worrying livestock report it to the Police on 101. Posting details on local social media, such as the Mayfield Village Facebook group may also help to alert the owner. You should have description of the dog and an accurate location (If you have mobile phone signal, The What 3 Words App or website is ideal www.what3words.com).

Q3: Where are livestock "allowed" to be?

Farmers can keep livestock on any land they wish. Many sheep farmers rent land as well as own their own. Livestock are regularly moved around as grazing becomes depleted and it is often not practical for farmers to put up signs for specific fields, not least as these can be interfered with and so would not be reliable. Sheep that have escaped from their field but are still on agricultural land are still protected by the Act.

Q4. Can farmers shoot my dog?

In short, yes! If a farmer comes across worrying in progress and the dog is out of control then they can legally shoot the dog. There is no compensation due to the dog owner, and the farmer may claim compensation from the dog owner for the loss they have incurred. If the attack has already happened and there is evidence to identify the dog(s) concerned, the Police

Lambing has already started on farms with indoor lambing facilities and lambing in the fields is starting in the coming weeks, so over the next couple of issues we are planning a series of Q&As and some links to further information.

Because of the recent attacks, local farmers have set up a communication network to alert each other of potential problem dogs so they can respond to reports quickly and appropriately.

Loose, unaccompanied dogs are unacceptable in the countryside and if you witness one please do the responsible thing and report it immediately to save unnecessary harm and suffering to both livestock and the dog (see below for how to do so).

We hope the following will raise awareness of the issue and encourage responsible use of the countryside.

Q1: What is livestock worrying?

The Dogs (Protection of Livestock) Act 1953, states "worrying" includes not only attacking sheep but chasing them in a way that may cause injury, suffering, abortion or loss of produce, or simply a dog being at large not on a lead or otherwise under close control, in a field or enclosure in

can prosecute the owner, and, in some circumstances, seize the dog(s).

Q5: Where can I walk my dog safely in the countryside?



Firstly, you should stick to the designated footpaths or bridleways. In some places there are “permissive paths” that are not rights of way but are where the landowner has granted permission to walk. All paths are marked with waymarkers (see example image), and although a path may cross a field neither you nor your dog have the right to stray from that path. Footpath maps can be found online including <https://row.eastsussex.gov.uk/standardmap.aspx> and there are other printed maps and Apps available.

Q6: Should my dog be on a lead?

You should always have your dog on a lead when near or potentially near livestock. It is permissible to have your dog under “effective close control”, which means that it is close to you and will ALWAYS return to you immediately on command, even when distracted. As the majority of dogs will not do this reliably, it is good practice to keep your dog on a lead at all times when around livestock, or where you are not completely certain there is no livestock nearby.

Q7: What should I do when walking my dog in the countryside?

Whether or not around livestock, your dog should be always in sight and you should be aware of what it is doing. When entering a field, check that you can see the whole field and that there is no livestock present before letting your dog off the lead. If you cannot see the whole field area then do not release your dog until you can and put it back on the lead before crossing into another field.

Q8: What if my dog escapes from my property?

You must make sure that your dog cannot escape from your property, particularly if you live in or near a farming area, as it may find its way onto land containing sheep and livestock. If the dog causes an accident, or worries livestock, you could be prosecuted. Lost or escaped dogs have been the cause of several recent sheep attacks locally.

Q9: My dog wouldn't hurt anything and just wants to play, so isn't that OK?

No! All dogs, even the most friendly and docile, have the ability to worry livestock, and should be on a lead or under close control at all times where livestock are, or could be, present.

Q10: What should I do if I see sheep loose on a road or in a garden?

If you don't know who the owner of the sheep is, contact a local farmer, report them (with an accurate location eg What3Words) on local social media and if they are on the highway, report it to the Police.

Next month we aim to offer tips and advice on dog training and other considerations to be aware of when using the countryside so it can be enjoyed by everyone, whether for recreation, or as part of a livelihood.

The Wheatear

It's been a long winter, but rest assured that our summer migrant birds will soon be with us. As you read this, beating hearts and beating wings are powering tiny bodies through north African skies.

Wheatears are our earliest returning African migrants. It's a fast 3,000-mile flight from sub-Saharan Sierra Leone to Sussex for a 1-ounce Wheatear, and they've been recorded migrating at 500 miles a day. The dashing males arrive first, their soft, sun-

bleached shades of pink and buff topped with a dapper black bandit's mask. At Sussex Wildlife Trust's Southerham Nature Reserve near Lewes, you'll see them scurrying over the grazed downland turf or perched along the valley's fence lines. When they fly, Wheatears flash the white rump which gives them their name. Because Wheatears have nothing to do with wheat or ears. Their original name...well, courtesy prevents me from writing their old English name in such an upstanding publication – but let's just say they were named after their white behinds. Victorians and vicars bird watching in mixed company blushed when they were called upon to identify one, so their name was subtly censored.

Wheatear is a more palatable name for a tragically palatable bird. In Sussex, Wheatears were considered a local delicacy and were served at the finest banquets in Lewes, Brighton and Eastbourne. Sussex shepherds would trap them to increase their income; in the late 19th Century the birds fetched 3/6d a dozen (£17.50 today). Shepherds could earn £14 per season (£1,260 today) trapping Wheatears - half their annual wage. Around the town, shepherds were eventually banned from trapping

Wheatears as it distracted them from their sheep.

Gluttonous gourmets were so desperate for fresh Wheatear that they would prowl the Downs and take birds straight from unmanned traps, leaving a pile of coins for the shepherds. In 1900, outspoken and outraged Sussex conservationist W.H. Hudson wrote, "It is not fair that Wheatears should be killed merely to enable London stockbrokers, sporting men, and other gorgeous persons who visit the coast, accompanied by ladies with yellow hair, to feed on them at the big Brighton hotels."

But the damage was done. Trapping and the gradual loss of their sheep-grazed downland habitat caused the birds to disappear from the Sussex Downs. The Wheatears we now see around Lewes, unsurprisingly, don't hang around. Each spring they briefly return to their old downland haunts, flash their behinds at the people of Sussex and keep on moving. From Lewes, they'll head onwards to breeding sites in northern England and northern Europe. But for some of these birds, their amazing migration continues for a further 2,000 miles across cold oceans to Greenland and Arctic Canada.

UTILITY SERVICES SUPPORT

MAYFACS want to highlight the support that is available for utilities and services to anyone who is vulnerable within our community. Many of these applications can be undertaken by individuals or by family members as well, so if you need any extra support, please do use the available services.

Wealden District Council: Assisted Collection Service for Waste – W.D.C. recognise that some people are unable to place their containers at the boundary of

their property on waste collection days for a number of reasons. They are able to offer "assisted collections" where the bin operatives can collect and return the containers from an agreed and convenient location. There are certain criteria to be eligible for this support (not to be used for long driveways, or absence for example) so please refer to the Council's website for more information and register for the scheme via the online form - <https://www.wealden.gov.uk/recycling-and-waste/assisted-collection-service/>

South East Water Priority Register

During periods of water shortage, if you are unable to collect water from the emergency water stations and you are a vulnerable customer (age/mobility/health) then you can be added to the Priority Register and receive deliveries of emergency supplies to your doorstep whilst the outage is ongoing. Please call SE Water directly on 0800 952 4000.

Energy Suppliers Priority Register

Energy Suppliers and Network operators also carry a Priority Register so that you can get advanced notice of scheduled power cuts, priority support in an emergency, nominating someone to manage bills and communications from suppliers and accessibility information. You may also be able to access free gas safety checks.

You will need to register individually directly with your supplier, and if using different suppliers for gas and electricity, you will need to apply to each supplier separately. If you need any further support or information, please contact MAYFACS and we can point you in the right direction. We also have a pool of incredible volunteers who can assist with any one-off assistance or support needed.

MAYFIELD CLIMATE CHANGE

The threat to dark skies, our ability to see the stars and the adverse impact light pollution has on animal and human health has been gaining increasing publicity. The High Weald Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty is home to some of the darkest skies in the southeast. But this can easily change and light pollution is already greater than you might expect in our parish. Mayfield is therefore delighted to be joining with other Wealden parishes, such as Wadhurst and Ticehurst, in seeking Dark Sky Community certification. To achieve this, we need our Parish Council to adopt a robust dark sky policy and we need Wealden District Council to apply that policy when reviewing planning proposals. That will help to stop the problem getting worse. At the same time, we need a lighting plan to deal with the worst pollution. We need to make sure light is used where it is needed, with nature friendly bulbs and directed downwards to the ground, rather than upwards where it is wasted, polluting our dark night sky.

If you want to learn more about Mayfield Climate Action and to help shape our work as well, come along to the Community Forum. The next meeting is being held at Wadhurst Park and will be receiving presentations from its CEO on carbon auditing, while Wealden District Council will be seeking views on its new climate change strategy.

VILLAGE PEOPLE

TIM SCHOOLEY - ESTATE DIRECTOR MAYFIELD GIRLS SCHOOL

It is exactly a year since Tim Schooley started his role at Mayfield Girls School as Head of Grounds. Prior to 15 years running his own horticultural business, which included design and landscaping projects, he had worked on historic estates and period properties, gaining knowledge and a deep understanding of the issues related to maintenance and development of listed buildings and the ancient crafts associated with them. Thankfully, his skill set beyond his initial role was quickly recognised and, within two months, he became Estate Director.

Tim was faced with a complex and challenging job description which spanned a huge range of areas over the 85-acre estate and included: utilities, buildings, grounds, security, horticulture, the equine centre and specialist PE facilities. This made all the more

complex due to the age of the buildings and systems, the position of the school within the heart of the village and the proximity of public footpaths running through and around the school grounds, together with the fact that in term time there are 400 pupils, including over 200 boarders who are at the school day and night.

So, Tim, assisted by three managers and the grounds team, set to work. The first task was to investigate the utilities and identify the myriad of pipes which lay under the site. What they found was a maze underground, including 2 buried BT lines that were meant to feed the village, 3 gas mains not on a network, asbestos drainage pipes and 2 redundant water pipes, one of which ran through the site with no apparent end. There was no clear way to attribute energy use to specific areas with three mains supplying the site. It is now a much tighter ship with separate feeds to 9 different buildings and a meter attached to each. If there is a surge in energy use, it is now easy to see where this is coming from. There are also new manholes which enable ease of access for maintenance. The site being on a hill lends itself to the downward flow of water which can occasionally cause havoc while tracking down through a range of school buildings. There are two natural springs in the grounds and some of the fields used for grazing are permanently waterlogged. A pond has been dug on the corner where the footpaths diverge which will ease the drainage situation and make way for a much more user-friendly footpath. The local council have recently visited and placed new waymarkers so that permitted paths are now clearly signposted hopefully reducing any tension that misunderstandings around this issue can cause.

Tim is keen to liaise more closely with the community in order to explain the reasons behind developments and changes on site and he has agreed that a regular update in the Newsletter might be a useful way to get this information across. As a village, we are so fortunate to have the school and its historic buildings in our midst, providing an atmospheric backdrop for many events such as the recent filming in the Chapel of the feast scene for the Community Film.

One of Tim's passions is biodiversity; he is well aware that over recent years there has been a huge urbanisation of the school with the new sports facilities, driveways and car parks. As part of Biodiversity Net Gain, a government scheme, he is keen to ameliorate the impact of this by planting a mixed hedgerow with trees along the route of the footpath which will act as a wildlife corridor and on the other side, a wild flower meadow. This will have the benefit of low maintenance but will encourage a wide range of insects and wildlife. Tim is a knowledgeable plantsman and has many exciting plans for beds, borders and courtyards. These include an eye-catching 'hot' planting scheme which will include sunflowers, cosmos and banana plants near the lower school which will replace an area previously covered in woodchip. He has rejuvenated the area outside Reception which, once the plants have developed, will provide a stylish welcome to visitors as well as a calm seating area for staff. As if this wasn't enough, there are also renovations being carried out to old-fashioned boarding houses and staff accommodation, all in tandem with the building of a new Wellness Centre. This will be a safe refuge for girls who may be feeling vulnerable and below par. There will be comfortable places to sit and through the glass doors will be a courtyard with curved benches where the girls can enjoy the garden. I think

it is evident that Tim is working above and beyond, not only to bring the pipework under control and continue the upkeep and development of buildings but also to provide, through thoughtful planting and design, a nurturing, biodiverse and caring environment which will support the girls on what is not always an easy journey, especially when many miles from home. **Barbara Murray**

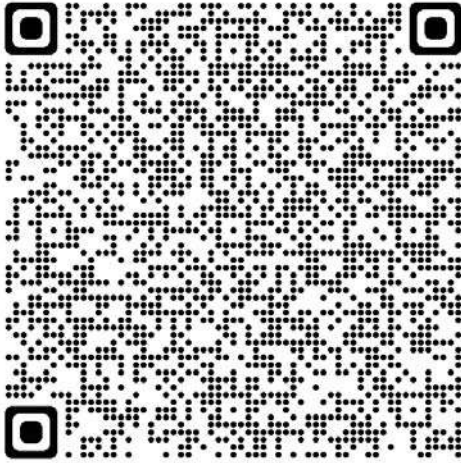

WOODHILL SURGERY

From 1st April, we will see some permanent changes to our **GP schedule**:

Friday: Dr Stephen Fletcher & Dr Steven Miller

In addition to the above, we are also supported by the following additional roles that have been put in place to grow additional capacity known as ARRS roles.

Care Co-ordinator – Karen McQuillen is our Care Co-ordinator. She acts as a link between outside organisations, patients and the surgery providing support for cancer patients and their families, patients diagnosed with dementia and other social needs. She runs clinics at the surgery and visits patients in their homes if required.

Physician Associates – We are lucky enough to have two, **Hannah Tweed and Oliviya Doos** who work various days throughout the week, although Hannah is about to embark on Maternity leave. Physician Associates (PAs) are healthcare professionals with a generalist medical education who work alongside doctors providing medical care as an integral part of the multidisciplinary team. Physician Associates are dependent practitioners who work under the supervision of a fully trained and experienced doctor within a defined scope of practice and limits of competence. They are able to: take medical histories from patients; carry out

physical examinations; see patients with undifferentiated diagnoses; see patients with long-term chronic conditions; formulate differential diagnoses and management plans; perform diagnostic and therapeutic procedures; develop and deliver appropriate treatment and management plans; request and interpret diagnostic studies; provide health promotion and disease prevention advice for patients.

They bring new talent and add to the skill mix within teams, providing a stable, generalist section of the workforce, which can help to ease the workforce pressures that the NHS currently faces.

First Contact Physiotherapist – Gary Kennedy (Wednesday afternoons). First Contact Physiotherapists (FCPs) are qualified autonomous clinical practitioners who can assess, diagnose, treat and manage musculoskeletal (MSK) problems and undifferentiated conditions and, where appropriate, discharge a person without a medical referral. FCPs working in this role can be accessed directly by self-referral or by staff in the surgery, without the need for a GP referral.

Social Prescribing Link Worker – Jo Wood. Social prescribing enables all primary care staff and local agencies to refer people to a link worker. Link workers give people time and focus on what matters to the person as identified through shared decision making or personalised care and support planning. They connect people to community groups and agencies for practical and emotional support. They work within multidisciplinary teams and collaborate

with local partners to support community groups to be accessible and sustainable and help people to start new groups. Social prescribing complements other approaches such as ‘active signposting’. Link workers typically support people on average over 6-12 contacts (including phone calls, meetings and home visits).

The Friends and Family Test (FFT) is an important feedback tool that supports the fundamental principle that people who use NHS services should have the opportunity to provide feedback on their experience. Listening to the views of patients and staff helps identify what is working well, what can be improved and how. The FFT asks people if they would recommend the services they have used and offers a range of responses. When combined with supplementary follow-up questions, the FFT provides a mechanism to highlight both good and poor patient experience. This kind of feedback is vital in transforming NHS services and supporting patient choice. Please visit our website www.ashdownmedicalgroup.co.uk and complete the FFT. It should not take any longer than a couple of minutes to complete and I thank you in advance.

Pharmacy First:

From 1st February 2024, people in Mayfield and Five Ashes can go to St. Dunstan’s Pharmacy for help with seven minor conditions, which would previously have required a GP appointment. Most pharmacies will offer the new service, giving advice and, if needed, NHS medicines, to people in certain age groups seeking help to treat seven common health conditions, without needing to get a GP appointment. NHS prescription charges apply if you normally pay for medicines supplied on prescription.

Should the pharmacy team be unable to help, you will be directed to your GP surgery or A&E as appropriate. By thinking ‘Pharmacy First’, people will find it easier and quicker to get the help they need. The new service is part of a wider expansion of healthcare services that will empower pharmacists to use more of their skills and give people more choice about their healthcare. It is also hoped that the service will be expanded to include more conditions in the future.

The conditions that the pharmacy can now help with are:

MAYFIELD COMMUNITY & HEALTH CENTRE

Work is now proceeding at pace. A preliminary design has been produced with the main criteria being that both the Hall and the Community Hub will look out over Court Meadow – deemed to be an important requirement for those using the Community Centre in the future.

The architect's contract is about to be placed whereupon the design will be finessed with a view to having a public consultation in the next couple of months, followed by an application for planning permission. This is the outcome of discussion with the local Planning Authority, which suggested that despite the original Plan A having received planning approval, Plan B, being slightly smaller to meet the budget, is sufficiently different to require a new application. The outcome of the planning process is expected in the autumn.

Once planning approval has been obtained and the final design drawings have been made available, the main build contract will be placed, which is expected to be around the end of the current calendar year. We are therefore still targeting completion for December 2025 if all goes to plan.

An independent quantity surveyor was appointed by the Parish Council to analyse the submissions that we have received from interested contractors for the building contract. The analysis suggests that the current approach provides value for money, together with some certainty regarding costs via a fixed price contract. The experience and quality are also what we would wish for, so we have the confidence that we are proceeding in a justifiable manner. The cashflow projections have been further finessed and

the project is still viable, especially with the grant awarded from the Community Ownership Fund (COF) which comprises a capital and revenue element amounting to £297,463 in total. Other grant applications are in the pipeline, all of which should provide some contingency as well as ensuring the design brief can be achieved. MAYFIELD FESTIVAL OF MUSIC AND THE ARTS

The 2024 Mayfield Festival of Music and the Arts is being held from 26th April to



12th May (inclusive) and the Box Office is already open. The Festival's Artistic Director, Jeremy Summerly, has excelled himself this year: the quality of the artists booked to perform at the Festival is simply breathtaking.

Coming to Mayfield during the Festival period will be one of the world's leading interpreters of the baroque repertoire, **Rachel Podger**, the musical phenomenon, **The London Community Gospel Choir**, the world-renowned pianist **Imogen Cooper** and Festival favourites **Oxford Camerata**. Add to this

an opening night adaptation of William Shakespeare's **Macbeth** that played to rave reviews at last year's Edinburgh Fringe, and performances of the complete **Brandenburg Concertos** over two nights (featuring a rising star of the world of classical music, **Jack Gonzalez-Harding**, and an array of world class period soloists). There will also be two appearances by the **Mayfield Festival Choir**, a performance of **Elgar's Cello Concerto** and a night of songs by **Cole Porter** and it is clear that Mayfield's cultural cup will be overflowing with talent during the period of the Festival.

As if the foregoing was not enough, perhaps the most anticipated event at the Festival is **Gin and Phonic**, the third instalment of Oz Clarke and Armonico Consort's series of events exploring the history of alcoholic beverages through the prism of classical music. This year, their focus is gin and such is the extent to which their reputation following past performances at the Festival that there are already only a few tickets left for this event. Widespread marketing of the Festival in surrounding towns and villages starts in the first full week of March so if you want a ticket for Gin and Phonic and have not yet got one now is the time to make your purchase.

TUNBRIDGE WELLS INTERNATIONAL MUSIC COMPETITION

As part of the Festival, the Tunbridge Wells International Music Competition will be taking place between 30th April and 5th May. The aim of the Competition is to encourage youthful musical talent, and it has been going since 1979. In that time, it has seen many of its winners, such as Paul Lewis and Anne-Sofie von Otter, go on to international careers in music.

The Competition held in 2022 was a great success, with a record number of young people taking part. The three finalists, Edvard Pogossian, cello (also overall winner and Audience Prize Winner); Tabea Streicher, piano; and Sofiia Matviienko,

flute, have gone on to even greater things since then, winning more prizes and taking part in concerts around the world. This is also true of other former finalists, with some even taking to composing – a piece by Joy Lisney, cello, who was a strings finalist in 2018, was recently premiered at the Wigmore Hall, in a concert by the Mithras Trio, made up of two



former finalists, Dominic Degavino, piano and Ionel Manciu, violin, together with Leo Popplewell, cello. The trio won the Royal Overseas League Music Competition in 2019 and has just launched its first CD.

The Competition is held in the beautiful surroundings of Mayfield Girls School. A programme of wonderful playing will be on offer on all six days: the first round from 30th April to 3rd May; the semi-finals on 4th May and the finals on 5th May. Anyone can come along to the school to hear the stars of tomorrow play at a very reasonable cost. Edvard Pogossian will be giving a concert during the Festival, as one of the aims of TWIMC is to offer performance opportunities to its finalists. In fact, he will be playing the iconic Elgar Cello Concerto in the final concert of the Festival. The winner of this year's Competition will return in 2026.

As ever, there will be an impressive panel of judges casting a firm but fair eye over the young competitors. This year, they are Martin Roscoe and Susan Tomes, piano section; Juliet Bausor and Richard Watkins, wind; and Raphaël Pidoux and Louise Williams, strings. Two of the judges, horn player Richard Watkins and pianist Martin Roscoe, will also be giving a concert on Friday, 3rd May, in a tradition started by Levon Chilingirian, the President of the Competition.

The Competition is run by volunteers and funded by donations, and the Friends Scheme, a link to which can be found on the website, is open to anyone. We are always looking for volunteers who can help in a variety of ways, from reception to driving to stewarding. If you would like to be involved, please contact: info@twimc.org.uk. It is always fun to get to know one of the competitors better and hosts can become very proprietorial towards 'their' musician. So, plenty on offer – from coming along to watch to getting very involved – and it would be lovely to welcome more Mayfield residents contributing to the success of the Competition.

MAYFIELD AND FIVE ASHES PERFORM 'THE PASSION' **EVERYONE IS INVITED!**



It will not be quite on the scale of what you might experience in York or Coventry but, on Palm Sunday, 24th March at 2.30pm, members of our dramatic and music groups and societies, in association with Colkins Mill, St. Thomas' and St. Dunstan's churches, will come together in Mayfield High Street to perform Mayfield and Five Ashes' very own Passion Play.

Directed by professional actress and director, Kathy Pogson, who lives locally and is well-known to many, every resident of Mayfield and Five Ashes is invited, indeed enthusiastically encouraged, to come along and take part as a community, with an assembled cast, in the High Street, in what promises to be a truly engaging and movingly dramatic representation of the trial, suffering,

death and resurrection of Jesus.

There will be those amongst you who will immediately be thinking "Oh no, that is not for me!" simply because, to them, such a Play means church and religion, and the organisers do understand that reaction. Passion Plays have always been a traditional part of Lent in several Christian denominations for centuries, which is why several of our Churches are involved in this production. For Kathy, who was invited by Judy Harland of Colkins Mill Church to bring it all together, it also offers an opportunity to witness and reflect on sacrifice, courage and sharing.

Kathy really only understood why she needed to be part of this project when having a political discussion about the current state of our divided society, the world economy and the global suffering being endured by so many. These are very human issues affecting our very existence, and to come anywhere close to dealing with them, let alone solving them, requires an element of sacrifice on the part of everyone.

Participating in this event is a sacrifice of time and a sharing of skills to bring the villages together, as a group, and provides the chance for each one of us to think about and reflect on the themes of kindness, love, tolerance, forgiveness, and redemption.

Indeed, the cast of over 30 people have already been sacrificing every Saturday afternoon, for some weeks now, to rehearse the script, which is an adaptation of several Passion Play scripts previously used by churches and venues in other locations. This version of the story will have some contemporary touches, which perhaps will help us access this representation of the Passion. Many academics regard such Plays as the basis of British theatre, as they brought dramatic

performance into public awareness, and that without their use in religious settings, the works of Shakespeare, for instance, may never have been written.

The Play is very much intended to be a grassroots production, produced by the community for the community. The production team, however, is fortunate to be supported on the technical front by the Wateryard Theatre Group of which Kathy is one of the Patrons. Wateryard is supplying the stage crew, the props, the wardrobe, and the Stage Manager is a professional whose experience will be invaluable to the team.

Not only that, but Kathy is hoping to involve many of the village choirs and music groups including the choirs of the churches involved, MayZing Community Choir and Mayfield Band.

If everyone turns up there is every reason to think that it will be a joyful coming together of our community, our beliefs, and our passions. What is more, it will cost you nothing to come along, other than your time and your enthusiastic engagement. However, you are asked that, if you are minded to attend, you pick up a ticket from 'Sew Inspired' or Burnetts beforehand to ensure that you get a hot cross bun! This also enables the organisers to gauge the level of response for practical staging reasons. It is hoped that lots of people intend to turn up, which will be a very positive outcome, but it does need to be planned.

Please do come and get involved, bear witness and add your voice to the most famous and enduring story of all. There is no more important time for our community to come together than now. See you there!

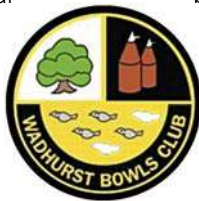

Warning About A Fox

A distressed resident contacted the office informing us that a fox in their garden during the day had become aggressive and had bitten them. This occurred in a garden off West

Street so please be aware that there might be one in the area that is not timid! Statistically, the risk that foxes pose is very small. However they can be dangerous to humans if they are

cornered or provoked but even then, their natural tendency is to flee rather than fight.

If you are attacked or bitten by a fox, try your best to stay calm. The fox might run away, but if it doesn't, try making a loud noise or even clapping to scare it away. If you are out

walking a pet, don't be tempted to let your pet run after it. Instead, focus on getting some medical attention if bitten. Foxes usually have a natural fear of people so if you see a fox

outside during the day, it's normally no cause for alarm and will more likely run away if it sees you.

Proposed Upgrade Of Mast And Apparatus In Tunbridge Wells Road

EE has asked the Parish Council to consult on a proposed upgrade to the existing equipment where the 10m lamppost column mast (194mm diameter) is to be replaced by a

15m pole (406mm diameter), the removal of one cabinet to be replaced by two cabinets, with a total of 5 cabinets. This exercise is prior to any formal planning application being

submitted to Wealden District Council for public consultation.

Don't Be Alarmed!

Mayfield Girls School has notified the Council that the school will be testing a new Lockdown alarm system.

They will have master blaster sirens fitted that will cover the whole school site and will most likely be heard on the High Street. The full lockdown test is likely to take place in early March so be warned!

Temporary Road Closure Warnings

Lake Street and Coggins Mill Lane are scheduled to be closed on 6th March from the junctions with Fletching Street and Little Trodgers Lane to allow BT Openreach to carry out apparatus repair works. Advance warning signs will be placed on site advising of actual date of works.

Newick Lane is scheduled to be closed from the junction with Stone Cross to the junction with the A265 Burwash Road from 11th March to 13th March to allow South East Water to carry out apparatus repair works.

Stonehurst Lane is scheduled to be closed from the junction with Skippers Hill to the junction with Dewlands Hill from 20th March to 21st March to allow BT Openreach to carry out further works at this location.

Little Trodgers Lane to Lake Street is scheduled to be closed from the junction with Lake Street to the junction with Tunbridge Wells Road from 8th April to 12th April to allow South East Water to carry out apparatus repair works.

Draft Local Plan

Wealden District Council's Draft Local Plan was discussed at an Extraordinary Meeting of their Full Council on Thursday, 8th February after which Councillors approved it and agreed for the formal Regulation 18

consultation to begin in March 2024. The consultation will run for eight weeks and people will be able to view the Draft Local Plan at a virtual exhibition and in-person drop-in sessions.

If adopted, the Local Plan will provide a vision for the Wealden District, its strategic and non-strategic planning policies to guide development and locations the Council proposes for new homes, jobs and infrastructure to help meet the district's needs. Dates and details of the consultation and exhibition will be released later. The information will be made available on the community website when received. Volunteer Streets Weed Maintenance

In the past couple of years East Sussex County Council (ESCC) undertook trials for alternative weed maintenance techniques in selected areas of Hastings and Lewes. It has been agreed that Volunteer Streets Weed Maintenance will become a standard option available to communities/residents who meet the relevant requirements if they choose to 'opt out' of the standard herbicide weed maintenance option.

The Volunteer Streets Weed Maintenance approach gives residents of certain streets the option to 'opt out' of Glyphosate weed spraying. This is done with the expectation that a Lead Volunteer for that road ensures a minimum of 60% of the residents of that street agree to be part of the option and that volunteers would undertake some form of weed maintenance. Please note the road must meet certain requirements

such as low-speed limits, residential / cul-de-sacs, to qualify. The ESCC team will be able to assess and confirm streets on an individual basis. Digital Chat Service For Young People

A digital chat service supporting young people affected by criminal or sexual exploitation is newly available in Sussex. Young people aged 13-18 can ask "Is this OK?" via a chatbot, - or connect to a real person for confidential support. "Is this OK?" is a free, anonymous, and confidential service, bringing trained professionals together to provide support for young people through a chat service. You don't need to provide your real name (a nickname is fine), and they don't need to know your address. They do not collect any data from your phone or computer (I.P. address). They will only know the things about you which you choose to share. Visit <https://www.isthisok.org.uk> for more information.

Online Safety Act

In February important changes were made to the Online Safety Act with the intention of improving safety on the internet by putting in place policies and processes to manage harmful and illegal content online. The new offences introduced include criminalising cyber-flashing; sharing intimate images of another person on or offline without their consent; sharing fake news intended to cause non-trivial harm along with other online abuses. Indecent exposure, commonly known as 'flashing' is already a crime so it is right that cyber-flashing is also recognised as illegal. If perpetrators send unwanted or unsolicited

pictures to gain sexual gratification or to cause alarm, distress, or humiliation, they will now face up to two years' imprisonment.

Another offence introduced is the sharing of intimate images of another person without their consent, often known as 'revenge porn'. Those found guilty of sharing an intimate image could be jailed for up to six months or two years if it is proven the perpetrator also intended to cause distress, alarm or humiliation, or shared the image to obtain sexual gratification.

Household Support Fund

The next round of the Household Support Fund is now live but the funding Wealden District Council has been given is limited, and the scheme will close on 31st March 2024, or earlier if funds have been exhausted. If you don't receive a Cost-Of-Living Payment because you are not in receipt of a Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) benefit or tax credits, but you receive Housing Benefit or Council Tax Reduction, they may be able to give you a Household Support Fund (HSF) payment. OBITUARY

BERENICE BLURTON

Extracts From "A eulogy to my mother" - Berenice Eileen Blurton (2nd March 1935 – 24th January 2024) - read at her funeral on 20th February 2024, at St. Dunstan's Church, Mayfield, by Philip Blurton.



Mum was born into the Godfrey family in Singleton, Australia, and grew up in the town of Gosford, New South Wales. She was the second of four children. Her younger sister, Lyndel, described Mum as the gregarious member of the family, who was good at maths, taught her to read music and had lots of friends. She liked to dress up, often making her own dresses, and to flounce around theatrically in her outfits.

At sixteen Mum finished school and went to teacher's college in Wagga Wagga. At age eighteen she was working as a primary school teacher in country towns, most notably Glen Innis, where she made many lifelong friends.

It was not unusual for young Australians to make a trip to Europe. In 1960 Mum bought a ticket to travel to England on the P&O ship, the Arcadia. One evening she was dining at the table of a charming young deputy purser, Dennis Blurton. Their courtship across the waves could not have been more stylish and romantic and led to their wedding in 1963 in Gosford, and wedding reception at Mum's favourite beach resort, Terrigal.

They honeymooned in Canada, and settled on a house being built in the Warren, Mayfield. They named it Terrigal and lived there for the rest of their lives.

Mum had two careers in England: her family and the Women's Institute. She was paid for neither of them and excelled in both. She joined the Mayfield Evening WI in 1975 and was a member for the rest of her life, attending her final meeting in January this year. She served on the WI committee in many roles over many years. She was President four times and also served at a county level, elected to the role of County Chairman of the East Sussex Federation of Women's Institutes between 2001 and 2004. She was a Voluntary County Organiser, now called a WI Advisor, who visited and supported other WIs. She sang in WI singing groups, danced in dance groups, took part in WI Pantomimes and drama festivals, theatrical events, cooking evenings, and WI exhibitions. She baked cakes,

made jam, and sang Jerusalem from the bottom of her heart.

On behalf of all our family, I would like to thank friends and organisations here today for their attendance, and for the emails, cards, letters, and many acts of kindness that we have received since Mum died. Your words of condolence and memories

of Mum have made us smile and cry and have been a pleasure and a comfort to read.

We mourn her loss deeply. Rest in peace Mum.

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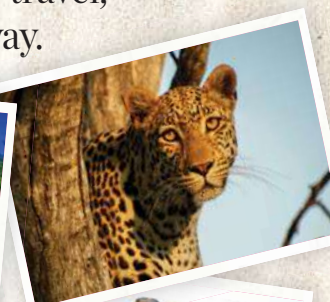
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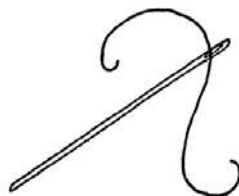
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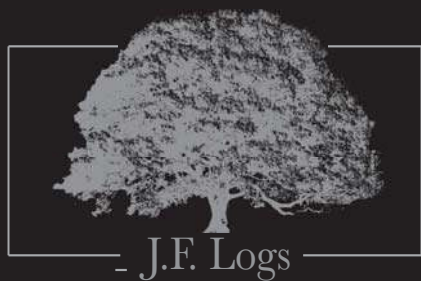
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
