SUSSEX WILDLIFE TRUST

Horse Chestnut

Far, far away in the south-east corner of Europe, the Balkan Mountains tower over the landscape. Their valleys were once home to the fearsome Thracian tribes, who made empires tremble when they rode screaming into battle on their wild horses. But even more ancient battles were being fought deep in these majestic mountains.

Here in the Balkans, there grew a strange and mighty tree. Its huge seeds were encased in spiky armour and its leaves



were like giant hands which cast shade all around. But this tree had been cursed. Each year a plague of tiny moths would attack the tree, their caterpillars would burrow inside every leaf. Green leaves turned to brown, leaving the tree apparently lifeless and defeated. Yet each year the tree would return with renewed green vigour, and each year the moths would attack with the same resolve. And so, for centuries the tree and the moth remained trapped in the Balkan Mountains, locked in their epic, age-old battle.

Then one day men came from the west, discovered this magnificent tree, gathered its seeds and planted them in their world. And so it was that the branches and the empire of the Horse Chestnut spread across Europe's parks and gardens. People admired it and reclined in the shade of its broad palmate leaves. Schoolboys used its seeds to fight their own playground battles. The conker tree had conquered the continent. Here in this new world the curse of the moth had been lifted and the Horse Chestnut flourished. Meanwhile, the tree's nemesis, not a particularly strong flyer, remained imprisoned in the remote valleys of the Balkan Mountains for centuries, more myth than moth. Then, one day, the modern world arrived. Construction workers building roads through the mountains were unwittingly building the perfect means for the moth to escape and spread. Now all it needed was a lift. So, the moth stuck out its six thumbs and hitched a ride.

Incredibly, the moth, just 5mm long, was able to disperse by grabbing on to passing vehicles. And so, like the ferocious Thracian tribes, the moth rode into battle. Screaming along highways, motorways, and autobahns on Volvos, Citroens, Fiats and Fords. The ancient battle spilled out from the Balkans as the moth was chauffeur-driven to every Horse Chestnut tree in Europe. The Horse Chestnut Leaf Miner moth was first discovered, identified and named in Greece in 1984. Twenty years later, in 2004, an innocent motorist pulled off the A27 into the University of Sussex car park, unaware they had brought a sinister stowaway into Sussex. Since then, every Horse Chestnut in Sussex has been motheaten. Look to the leaves and you'll see the great Balkan battle raging right on your doorstep.

VILLAGE PEOPLE

TUSHAR VANANI - ST. DUNSTAN'S PHARMACY MANAGER

It is nearly two years since our local pharmacy changed hands and became part of what is now Clarity Stores Ltd, a network of seven pharmacies across East Sussex and Kent including Biggin Hill, Ticehurst, Staplehurst, Cranbrook, St. Leonards-on-Sea and Bexhill.

The group is owned and managed by Hardik Desai, Ankit Tyagi and Terjas Avaiya, two of whom are pharmacists. The local Business Manager is Tushar Vanani and I interviewed him to find out what progress had been made since they took over, and to gain an understanding of the issues which have arisen.

Tushar, who has a degree in Chemistry from the University in Gujarat, and a Masters in Business from the University of Hertfordshire, explained that the overall ethos of the pharmacy is to serve the local community and be responsive to the needs of local people. This has become increasingly difficult against a backdrop of core funding reduction of 30% since 2015 and difficulties in the supply chain since Brexit. The recent rise in inflation has made matters even worse. In a recent report it was declared that the Community Pharmacy Funding Framework is not fit for purpose and recommended an overhaul. Although there are no quick fixes, it seems that the new government has pharmacies in their sights, so hopefully help is on its way. In the meantime, there is no doubt that local pharmacies are under threat, with many having closed in the last few vears.

In Mayfield we are fortunate that our pharmacy is part of a larger and supportive



network. We can also all play a part in providing support by buying our chemist items locally. There are many products available in the pharmacy, which are well organised and attractively displayed, including ranges such as Simple, Faith in Nature, Infinity foods, professional supports for sports fanatics, make-up and hair products. By using this local resource for presents, cleansers, cotton wool etc we are helping our pharmacy to survive in this ever more competitive marketplace.

Tushar, is supported by Fatima, Jignasha and Debra, who has 18 years' experience and provides an invaluable service preparing blister packs for drugs, making it easy for patients to take the right pills at the right time. The team, which also includes two locums, pull together to provide a wide and useful range of services, all of which take the pressure off the local GPs. Tushar explained that as part of Pharmacy First they now offer diagnosis and treatment for seven common

conditions, which include the use of antibiotics when appropriate. The illnesses and age parameters are as follows:

Ear infections in children (aged 1-17), urinary tract infections (16-64), shingles (18+), Sinusitis (12+), Impetigo in children (1+) and sore throat (5+).

This is of benefit not only to the patients who receive quick efficient advice and medicine for these common ailments, but also to the local doctors who can spend more time on patients with complex and serious complaints. This service is in addition to blood pressure checks, ear wax micro suction and vaccinations for Covid and Flu. They also offer travel vaccinations for which there is a charge. The main service however is the supply of prescription medicines which, due to supply issues and reduction in funding, is currently fraught with difficulty. There are times when demand for certain, often important, drugs, outstrips supply. When this happens, Tushar asks his network if they have the drug in stock, which can relieve the situation temporarily but this is not always possible and ultimately it means paying above the drug tariff in order to secure the supply. The situation is not helped by some pharmacies stock piling certain drugs.

He stressed the importance of the 'human touch' in the pharmacy where they can speak to patients about their issues and, if necessary, work with the local surgery, either to supply prescriptions for appropriate drugs or their alternatives in the event of supply problems, or to refer on for a face-to-face appointment. This, including free delivery, must be preferable to the on-line pharmacy service which has long waiting times and lacks patient knowledge and responsiveness.

Tushar confesses, having always lived in big cities, he felt a little anxious when he knew he was coming to rural Mayfield, but has been amazed at how welcoming, friendly and supportive the whole community has been. He is also grateful to his team, and particularly to the local surgery for their flexibility and willingness to work so closely with the pharmacy, ensuring a joined up service. He has left a mum in Gujarat, and his sister is a doctor in New Zealand, so this acceptance has clearly meant a great deal to him and he did admit that: 'Mayfield is my heart'. Hopefully the current difficulties will be tackled, and our wonderful and local pharmacy will have a bright and positive future.

YELLOW PAGES GOING GREEN

After 2023's successful Harvest Moon walk, we are celebrating the Hunter's Moon this year, with a night walk on the evening of 17th October. Online registration will open in September as a prelude to the Wild About Dark Skies Festival running across the High Weald National Landscape from 28th October to 10th November. More details to follow.

Mayfield is one of nine Wealden parishes keen to achieve International Dark Sky Community status. With strong support from the Parish Council and light meter readings confirming that, for the most part, we enjoy truly dark skies, an application is on the cards for 2024/5 but we need your support to make it happen. In particular, the more people who can sign a pledge to five simple principles, the better. They are:

- 1. Just light the area you need. If you want to light the path to your house, don't also light your neighbour's garden or the wider countryside
- 2. Shield and point lights down. Upward pointing lights are really bad for creating "sky glow" the sort of orange glow you see when you look in the direction of Tunbridge Wells where you certainly won't see any stars. Shield your lights and point them downwards.
- 3. Less bright light bulbs. LEDs use far less electricity than the old incandescent lights but they can be much brighter! Lights that are too bright cause glare which means we can't see as well at night compared with dimmer lights. It may seem counterintuitive, but dimmer lights are more secure than bright ones.
- 4. Timers and sensors. If you can't just turn outside lights on and off when required, why not put them on a timer? There's really no need for lights to be on all night. And / or use a sensor so the light is only on when it's needed?
- 5. Warm-white bulbs. A lot of LEDs are bright blue-white. This is the worst frequency range for wildlife and humans too. Warm-yellow lights are much better for the environment, and much nicer to look at as well. One more thing indoor lights can spill outdoors. Remember to draw your curtains! You can sign the pledge by popping into Burnett's. Thank you!

Steve Lawrence resigned as one of our two Churchwardens earlier this year, and at an Extra-ordinary Vestry Meeting Carl Walters was nominated and elected to succeed him.

Both Carl and Stephen Blurton were admitted to their role as Churchwardens for this year by the Archdeacon of Hastings (Venerable Edward Dowler, soon to be the new Dean of Chichester Cathedral) in June. We all wish them well.



ROUND AND ABOUT THE VILLAGES

MAYFIELD COMMUNITY & HEALTH CENTRE MONTHLY UPDATE

One hundred and fifty-one parishioners turned out on 7th July to visit Mayfield's Scout and Guide Hall where the latest floor plans, external elevations and artists' impressions of Mayfield's new Community and Health Centre were on display. We consider this to be not a bad turn-out since the weather for much of the day was poor and will have impacted attendance levels.

The designs were recently completed by Miller Bourne Architects, who have worked closely with Baxall Construction and the Parish Council team to develop a building that satisfies the design brief and which meets the needs of the community. The latest design is based on the original scheme that received planning approval but which has been made affordable by adopting a 'Design & Build' method of construction along with a number of modifications and necessary compromises to the Community Centre.

The Health Centre has remained at a fixed area of 350m2 to meet the minimum requirements of the NHS Design Guidelines, while the Community Centre has had to be reduced by over 30% from 685m2 to 470m2, although the Community Hall remains the same size as that of the old Memorial Hall and has most of the original facilities.

Of those 151 attendees, 59 made written observations on the forms provided at the event. We are pleased to report that 81% were supportive of the design and general proposal with almost half (44%) using the word 'excellent design' or similar. We were also pleased that 15% of the respondents

said that they were appreciative of the efforts of the Councillor team in getting the project thus far.

In addition, 58% of the respondees individually took the opportunity to comment on the numerous detailed aspects of the design. Some 8% thought the building design was not in keeping with the vernacular of the village. A very small number thought the building was too large, whereas others thought it too small. A similar percentage (8%) thought the Health Centre should be located elsewhere in the village – not dissimilar to feedback from previous consultation events.


Other comments included concerns over a potential lack of storage space, the flat roof, kitchen location, entrance steps and potential traffic congestion, whilst sports changing rooms, a green living roof, a café rather than community hub and red tarmac instead of bricks for the roadway were deemed by some to be desirable.

The comments will be noted where possible as the design progresses, especially those relating to possible cost reductions or where implementation might be relatively straightforward. However, whilst the input is useful, many people making individual comments on the design, whilst relevant, were not fully cognisant of the numerous design constraints and the fact that designing a new Community Centre is very much a balance of conflicting requirements. Overall, the view seems to be that the design meets the original major design requirements but it is accepted that not everyone will be happy (which unfortunately will never be achievable). However, the overriding message was 'just get on with it'.

The drawings and information presented at the event are now on the Parish Council website <u>www.mayfieldfiveashes.org.uk</u> and are also available to view in the shop window of Hayley Cooper Aesthetics in the High Street.

The next project stages include the hosting of a public consultation event by Baxall Construction followed by the submission of a planning application to Wealden District Council.

Further information will continue to be placed on the village Facebook site and the Mayfield and Five Ashes Parish Council website, as it becomes available.

MAYFIELD FIRE STATION

I hope you are all aware of the possible closure of Mayfield Fire Station. The Fire & Rescue Service does an amazing job. Brave firefighters risk their lives for very little reward, working unsociable hours in often difficult and harrowing situations. Like most public sector services, they are continually being made to look for cost savings.

East Sussex Fire & Rescue Service are expecting a significant shortfall in their budget and one of the options they are considering is to shut the Mayfield Station and sell the land. I have heard their arguments and, while they make some interesting points, it feels like we are not being given all the information and that the Station's closure is a forgone conclusion.

Mayfield Fire Station is an important part of our village, not only there to protect us and our beautiful (often listed) buildings but also an integral part of our community. The people who work there are our neighbours and friends and we must do all we can to save it.

The consultation will close on 27th September so please act before then.

We will also be organising a petition. Please look out for this and support. There will be information events hosted by ESF&RS and as soon as the dates are confirmed we will share them with you. Please contact me with any questions.

MAYFIELD LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

The Society's summer outing took place on 3rd July to the National Trust Property, Standen House, a few miles south of East Grinstead. 14 members travelled by car. A short introductory talk was received shortly after arrival.

The house and gardens were created in the 1890's/early 1900's by James and Margaret Beale, who developed the property into a comfortable family home, with electric power, the very latest of interior designs and new plants in the gardens. The house is one of the finest examples of the Arts and Crafts with Morris and Co. interiors and decorative art. Stationed throughout the substantial property are numerous knowledgeable guides who will willingly give information and answer questions.

The estate covers almost 100 acres of hillside, ancient meadows and woodland. There are extensive walks and far reaching views over Weir Wood reservoir and the Ashdown Forest. The gardens are made up of outdoor "rooms" used for leisure, growing fresh produce, and showcasing the plant collection developed by Mrs. Beale. No longer owned by the Beale family, the National Trust has preserved Standen very much as the family would have known and loved it in the early part of the 20th century.

Refreshments and light snacks are available in the Barn Cafe. Picnics can be enjoyed in the grounds. A shop and plant centre offer the opportunity for purchases. Easily accessible by car, the house and estate are well worth a visit or two.

MAYZING SINGS WITH VOLYA VOICES AND SUPPORTS EMERGENCY MEDICAL RELIEF IN UKRAINE

On 14th July, when most of the country was inside watching our English football team battle valiantly against the Spaniards in the European Cup Final, the supporters of our local community choir, MayZing, came to St. Dunstan's to listen not only to us, but also to a most remarkable group of beautiful Ukrainian young women calling themselves Volya Voices, who are based in Bexhill and who all originally met at the Bexhill Hub, having arrived in the UK following the Russian invasion of Ukraine.

None of them are professional singers but they all have passion for the songs they learnt growing up in their country, and having left Ukraine, it was very important to them to continue to celebrate and be



proud of their culture and traditions, and to share them over here. Whilst they themselves now felt safe, they recognised that they needed to help those they had left behind, especially those serving in the armed forces, and that the best way to do this was to raise funds for emergency medical supplies to send to the front line. Thus, 'Volya Voices' was born, and the ladies have been performing at various local venues in East Sussex ever since, enchanting audiences by singing and dancing in their beautiful costumes and spreading their deep sense of love for





their country which is being torn apart by the ravages of war.

Each choir sang separately, with MayZing going first, conducted by the inimitable Ginger Millington, and then Volya Voices, introduced by one of their own number, in very good English. The two choirs then sang together a song by Labi Siffre, "Something Inside So Strong", itself a protest song, which felt especially moving, given Ukraine's current situation. Finally, with the whole audience joining in, we all sang and danced to a joyful version of Abba's "Dancing Queen". It was such fun! Watching and listening to Volya Voices was a quite remarkable experience, not only to



see their beautiful costumes and hear their charming voices within the hallowed walls of St. Dunstan's, but also to realise that these brave and amazing women are from a country fighting a grotesque and horrific war in modern Europe, at a time when it was thought impossible that this would ever happen again. Not only that, but several, if not all of them, have lost husbands and close family in this war, some quite recently, yet this has not

deterred them from sharing their love for their country and one another at this desperate time.

We are hoping that Volya Voices will join us in the future at another of our concerts, when you might like to come and support us all, and more particularly support their efforts to provide emergency medical relief in Ukraine in this lovely way.

OPEN FORUM

COURT MEADOW

I was pleased to see that Mr. Driscoll has praised the Parish Council for pushing ahead with the development of a replacement Memorial Hall, but he is less supportive for the installation of a new Medical Centre, aka surgery. He has raised some general queries, relating to the new Hall design, of general interest (e.g. ceiling height).

Having looked in detail at the Compulsory Purchase Order, made in 1935, for the purchase of just over 14 acres of Court Meadow, I have found it significant the Order was not signed by the Secretary of State for the Home Department, Sir John Simon, but rather, at that time, by the Minister for Health, Sir Kingsley Wood.

One of the reasons for the then Parish Council seeking a Compulsory Purchase Order, was to exclude the area from a proposed development, by probably the local solicitor F.W. Sprott, and now shown in an annotated 1911 Ordnance Survey map held in Kew record office.

1935 predates the creation of the National Health service by Aneurin Bevan, which now provides the United Kingdom with a free at point of use health service. In 1935 only exercise in public spaces was seen as an effective way of improving the health of local communities. Hence the period saw the rapid expansion of health groups, such as The

Women's League of Health and Beauty, that used open spaces like Court Meadow for mass exercise classes and displays. There are excellent films of these on old Pathé newsreels. (https://peopleshistorynhs.org/galleries/womens-league-of-health-and-beauty-1930-present)

We are now 95 years on from the original Compulsory Purchase Order that prevented the development of housing as sketched in on the map held in the PRO at Kew.

We are indeed fortunate that the local District Council has picked up the baton originally signed by Sir Kingsley Wood and offered to create a new medical centre on the land now owned by the Parish Council thanks to the Compulsory Purchase Order. At long last the original desire to improve the health of Mayfield and Five Ashes is coming to fruition.

OPEN LETTER

A wise woman in our village told us a few years back, that the only way to save Court Meadow from development was to find an alternative site for our surgery.

That has come to fruition. A dedicated team of local professionals – building contractors, surveyors, architects, design curators, bankers, and environmentalists – have been on a mission to find a site that would accommodate the doctors, patients, schools, traffic, protected green spaces, biodiversity, and well-being of our village.

The Level House site next door to the present surgery fits all the requirements. The new medical centre and its accompanying parking can fit comfortably at the site, and the owners have taken it off the market so that it is not snapped up

before the village can come to a decision on it.

The Level House site would be for the surgery alone, leaving Court Meadow free for a standalone village hall that could be either built on the current footprint, or refurbished by an ever-growing number of architects and builders who know that the most environmentally friendly building is the one that is already there. The Level House site would not interfere with traffic issues near the three schools. The site would not burden the drainage of Court Meadow which has flooded several homes at the bottom of the playing fields in recent years, nor add to the sewage runoff that has made its way down the field in periods of heavy rainfall. The biodiversity that thrives in the scrub land surrounding the mown lawn will also be protected.

Between 1937-1939, the King George V National Memorial Fund set up a trust to generate the purchase and protection of playing fields dedicated to sports and recreation – especially for children and young people. The Mayfield Playing Field was one of them. It has recently been discovered that leasing the land to the GP Surgery would trigger a non-compliance with the local Government Act 1972 (Sections 123 and 127) and that it would need the Secretary of States consent for any change.

The Level House site would be an asset to our village. In the case of the event that the NHS change their structuring in 25 years or less, the village would own a building that could be easily repurposed. Our village has enough money saved from the increased precepts to be able to purchase the Level House site. The village would be able to earn the money from the

doctor's surgery to help pay off any initial investment. The WDC could still help with the build. They are just as interested in helping with Surgeries and Medical Centres with or without the 'community centre' aspect of the build. It is predicted that building the surgery at the Level House site, coupled with a standalone village hall on Court Meadow would not be as costly as the current proposed development. When asked what might happen to the medical centre if it became outmoded, one of our Parish Councillors suggested 'office buildings?'.

To address one last issue - the threat that we will lose our doctors if we do not comply with the build on Court Meadow. When Dr Baseley was asked if we would lose them if the medical centre was not built on Court Meadow he did not say 'Yes.' He replied, 'Well, it is the best site we have come across so far' and of course it is. Court Meadow is aesthetically the best site - the best site for a cottage, a law office, a foreign language centre, a disco, a restaurant, an apartment block, a hotel, an estate agent - because it is beautiful. The view is outstanding, the air is sweet, and the soil is rich. However ethically, it is not the best site for a medical centre. We are proud of our GP Surgery, and we want them to stay. We want to make sure they have a clean, safe, and well-built surgery and that future generations of villagers will continue to have the green space they were aifted.

THE PARISH COUNCIL RESPONSE - COMMUNITY AND HEALTH CENTRE

The current Parish Councillors were elected last May by you, the residents, on the basis we all supported the development on Court Meadow of a new village hall and combined Doctors surgery. Unfortunately, despite the incredible efforts of a few councillors, the plan on which we had been working before the election could not progress as it was no longer affordable.

Since then, the Council has been working incredibly hard to find a solution: a building that we could afford, that would do all we need it to do and be acceptable for Wealden planners. The plans we presented on Sunday 7th July, which are on the Council website. Facebook and displayed in the High Street meet those criteria. The vast majority of comments that we have received have been supportive of those plans. However, there is a small, determined and vocal minority that opposes locating the Doctors surgery on Court Meadow and are advocating that it should be built on the site of the Level House in Station Road.

They believe that building the Doctors surgery on Court Meadow would be in breach of the Local Government Act. We are advised that this is not the case provided the letting of the surgery is at fair value, which it will be.

In any event their proposal does not work for several reasons:

Firstly, it is not affordable. We would have to find the money to buy the site and WDC have made it clear to us that they would not support the construction of a separate Health Centre building. We have no desire to burden future generations with greater debt than is already planned or to raise the parish precept further to pay for it. The objectors claim costs can be reduced dramatically from those which we

are currently negotiating in detail with contractors. We have seen no support for this claim. Secondly, we do not believe the Level House site is suitable. It is a narrow site and, despite its name, it is not level. We do not believe it would be possible to accommodate the Health Centre building we are planning on that site with the associated car parking spaces; and we have seen no plans to show how this would be achieved. It is also of note that the site is heavily wooded and many trees would need to be felled. No such destruction of trees is envisaged in the scheme we are pursuing.

Thirdly, to change course now would mean starting again. Not only would this be costly, but it would result in further delays of at least 18 to 24 months beyond our current planned completion of December 2025. In our view this would be unacceptable.

For all those reasons, we will not adopt the Level House proposal. I reiterate that the vast majority of residents support the Council's current scheme. Only a small minority oppose it. As a democracy, I urge those against the project to accept that the current scheme is what the Parish want and that they should respect that view. Instead of working against us, they should work with us to get the new Community and Health Centre built for all our benefit and for that of many generations to come.

Mayfield On-Call Fire Station Options Consultation

The concern on the possible closure

of Mayfield on-call Fire Station was discussed at the May and July 2024 Council meetings and it was raised for discussion at the recent Annual Parish Assembly. East Sussex Fire Authority held a meeting on 13th June to consider responses to their Options Appraisal for Mayfield Community Fire Station. This was attended by Cllr Tibbles and her report from that meeting included disappointment that she did not have an opportunity to put the Council's concerns to the attendees and that the Council's response to their Options Appraisal were not raised for consideration before their decision was made to move to the required consultation stage.

We urge as many residents as possible to take part in their consultation that runs until 27th September 2024 so the Fire Authority can be made aware of the community's consternation on its closure. This can be done online with the following link: https://www.esfrs.org/mayfield. Information on their options is available in the Parish Council office along with paper copies of the consultation for those not wanting to respond online.

The Fire Authority is asking you to consider the following:

Option 1 – Maintain Mayfield as a single appliance On-Call fire station and uplift the availability to the Service's minimum standard of 50% from the current 6% availability.

Option 2 – Closure and sale of the fire station, keep the fire appliance and

reinvest the revenue staff costs. This would enable the Service to reduce risk more

effectively through an improved response capability.

Option 3 – Closure and sale of the fire station and appliance and reinvest staff costs. This would enable a redistribution of staffing resource to reduce risk more effectively through an improved response capability.

Option 4 – Closure and sale of the fire station and appliance, and removal of the On-Call section as an additional saving to meet budget shortfall if required.

The findings will be considered at a Fire Authority meeting on 5th December 2024. The Council's response to the Fire Authority's Options Appraisal are below for your information:

What Do You Consider The Main Risks To Be In Your Local Area?

Fires burning listed buildings and old timber framed buildings in the Conservation Areas.

Flooding due to increased rainfall and consequential surface water run-off Road Traffic Collisions (RTC's) on the A267 RTC's at the junction of the A272/A267

Q2 Are there any local issues or impacts you feel we need to be aware of?

The volume of traffic, speed limit and accident-prone locations on the A267.

Three neighbouring schools in Mayfield.

High buildings with dormitories at Mayfield School.

The number of listed buildings and the Conservation Area.

The layout and sightlines of the junction of the A267/ A272.

The age demographic of residents.

The large number of local agricultural and equine businesses.

Q3 What information do you think we need to consider in developing the options?

The necessity of a rapid response for child safety at three schools.

The demographic of residents being elderly and requiring quicker response times.

Fires in high buildings in Mayfield Girls School and dormitories needing a fast response.

Listed and timber framed buildings susceptible to burning more quickly and Conservation Areas that should be protected to preserve our heritage.

The junction of the A272/ A267 having had the highest number of accidents in Wealden.

Rescue needed quickly for equine and agricultural accidents.

Q4 What are the factors we need to consider when taking the options appraisal out to public consultation?

Details regarding ownership of the fire station site and valuation of the land.

Incorrect rumours surrounding the financial value of the site and covenants on the land.

To consider all factors when assessing the closure – not just financial reasons.

Is the closure actually due to an insufficient number of recruits and the number of fire fighters needed to man an appliance that could be addressed?

Q5 What other ideas can you suggest for us to meet our financial challenges?

Publicising possible closure effectively would encourage recruitment.

The length of time that has to be taken off work to train as a fire fighter. It is not feasible to require an employed resident to book three weeks off work for example. Reassess your training procedures and programmes so enrolment is accessible to more local residents. For example, provide shorter sessions over a period of time to qualify.

Thefts Of Motorcycles Continue

Sussex Police has informed that they are still receiving reports of motorcycle theft in various areas of Sussex and urge the public to take extra precaution in ensuring their property is protected from theft.

They suggest: Lock, chain, cover

Lock: Use a disc lock to help secure the front brake disc, or a grip lock to secure the brake and throttle controls. You could also use a D lock on the front wheel to stop it being wheeled away.

Chain: Thieves often steal a bike by breaking the steering lock and wheeling it away. Use a chain lock through the back wheel (the front wheel can be removed). Secure your bike, with the lock taut to an immovable object such as a ground anchor or street furniture. This will stop thieves from cutting a lock trailing on the ground using an angle grinder. If this isn't possible, thread the chain through your bike frame and back wheel.

Cover: Thieves often 'shop' for particular bike models. Using a cover instantly makes it less attractive to them. A cover also provides another time-consuming obstacle for the thief.

Unfortunately, security measures cannot guarantee your bike will not be stolen but multiple security measures make it harder and less attractive for thieves. For security products for your scooter, motorcycle or moped search the 'Accredited products' page - (a police-approved website).
