

"JUST DRESSING UP AND PLAYING WITH FIRE, IT IS NOT!"

Catherine Hawley talks about the work of the Bonfire Society in our community

September is the month for Carnival in Mayfield and Five Ashes, and elsewhere in this edition, there is a full report on what the Bonfire Boyes and Belles have in store on 21st September with the Carnival and Bonfire Procession. The event usually takes place on the third Saturday of the month, which is closest to the date of the 1556 burning of the Christian Martyrs. The Society has been active since 1930 so is a long-standing institution of our villages.

Talking to Catherine Hawley recently, I confessed that, whilst I have been to the procession several times, I find the passionate fervour of the marchers, in dramatic costume and carrying their flaming torches and crosses, somewhat daunting and macabre. She is not surprised by that reaction, which she says is a common one, but she is keen to dispel the belief that the Bonfire Society exists, or its supporters are merely involved, for a day's "dressing up and playing with fire". Having heard what she has to say, I now





understand that the Bonfire Society clearly also plays a very valuable and important part in the life of our community.

Catherine is one of two Directors, along with Rob Foster (the main Carnival Event Planner and Treasurer), heading a committee of ten, who all work tirelessly throughout the year, planning and undertaking a range of activities to engage the villages and, specifically, to raise the funds necessary to run the annual Carnival. Roughly £10,000 is needed, half of which is made up of £2,500 to insure it; almost as much as the cost of the fireworks, which work out at £2,700. A further £1,000 goes towards employing qualified first aiders, close to £1,000 on the marching bands with the remaining £2,800 being used for the provision of toilet facilities, roadsweepers, bar and catering arrangements and torch and banner materials, amongst other things. Apart from £1,500 contributed by the Parish Council, £500 paid by catering and bar concessions and £1,500 raised from profit on the bar on the night of the Carnival, the remaining £6,500 must be raised during the year.

Rob, a retired industrial project manager, works on the event throughout the year, planning and preparing, booking the



necessary facilities with the appropriate authorities, making detailed arrangements for the day itself, and the clearing up at the end, so that, with the help of the Scouts, there is no evidence of the Carnival's existence the following day.

Catherine, a former senior manager with BT, with a team of up to 5000 engineers 'going up poles and down holes', is well equipped to manage the 'people' side of fundraising and publicity (such as social media and leaflet designing, printing and delivering around the whole village) for the events and activities which are held throughout the year. She is quick to make the point too that the fundraising goes well beyond financing the Carnival. The Society also aims to collect up to £2,000 a year for distribution to local good causes and this year the aim is to collect specifically for Mayfield Youth Band, the Scouts and MAYFACS Shedders, who are trying to expand their garden.

Events the Society have arranged or supported in recent years include Quiz

Evenings, a summer concert and a Build a Guy competition. This year the Society arranged its own Open Gardens event at 6 houses in The Warren and East Street in Mayfield, in addition to that of the National Gardens Scheme in July. The Warren/East Street event required 40 volunteers to steward the parking and entrance to the gardens and to bake and serve the teas. A showing of the 'Rocky Horror Show' was also held in Five Ashes Hall, for which the Society's Creative Group dressed up accordingly.

This small group, of mainly women and a couple of men, meet regularly to make the large and small banners which one can see around Mayfield during Carnival month and some of the costumes for the marchers in the procession. The banner work involves cutting, sewing, decorating and painting, and each banner, when complete, is water and fire-proofed and hung on washing lines to dry.

Another constant every year, throughout the year, is the torchmaking. Every month volunteers are involved in sourcing and cutting sticks and drilling holes. The torches are then assembled by yet more village volunteers every Saturday in July and August. However, by far the biggest village event organised by the Society, apart from the Carnival itself, is the Christmas Party for up to 100 senior citizens in our villages. Until Lockdown, followed by the closure of the Memorial Hall, this took the form of a 3-course Christmas lunch, served up by 20 people, of whom few were under 60 themselves. Indeed, there is no shortage of volunteers for this enjoyable and heart-warming event, which really spreads the joy and brings the villages together.

During Lockdown, the Committee arranged instead the delivery of 250 hampers throughout the villages, with



volunteer bakers preparing 1,000 items, including sausage rolls, cheese straws and mince pies. In the last year or so, with the continuing shortage of a large enough venue, a Christmas Tea Party has been held in Colkins Mill Church Hall, with a

similar bakery and serving contribution from the volunteers.

For Catherine and Rob, the Committee and the 60 or so Society volunteers involved during the year, the creation of the banners, the torchmaking, the running of the fundraising events and the Carnival Bonfire procession, and more, are all labours of love carried out with the prime purpose of maintaining the spirit of community in Mayfield and Five Ashes. It is also a very sociable way of being involved in village life.

Whether or not you enjoy the actual Carnival procession itself, the Bonfire Society does play a vital role in the life of Mayfield and Five Ashes. Such is the variety of its activities, there is bound to be some aspect of the Society's work to appeal if you are interested in getting involved, even if that does not extend to dressing up or fire-raising! SUSSEX WILDLIFE TRUST Wasp Spider

I never thought I'd say this, but I've fallen in love with a spider. And coming from a lifelong arachnophobe that's quite a claim. Whereas every other spider species sends me screaming in utter terror, the Wasp Spider has melted my heart. They are gorgeous. I met one on the South Downs last weekend and, hypnotised by her beauty, I spent hours with her; lying in the grass, staring lovingly into her eight eyes.

Wasp Spiders' rotund abdomens are delicately patterned with exotic black, yellow and white stripes. Every Wasp Spider looks subtly different – as if each has been individually hand-painted. Their eight legs wear stripy black and white stockings - the sort favoured by the Wicked Witch of the East. This stripy, waspish appearance has given the spider its name and is used as a defence mechanism to ward off predators who equate this colouration with being stung. They're a relatively new resident in England. The first British Wasp Spider was found near Rye in 1922. Since then they have slowly spread across Sussex and you can find them in any areas of grassland. Here inside their long grass lair, they weave their silky circular webs which - like all spider webs - are a masterpiece of arachnoid architecture. As if proud of her accomplishment, the Wasp Spider autographs her web with a unique silken squiggle. The actual purpose of this thick zigzag flourish (the 'stabilimentum') is a mystery; although some believe it reflects UV light, luring in pollinating insects who mistake the web for a flower.

Male Wasp Spiders don't have it easy. Physically they lack any snazzy patterning and at 5mm are a third of the size of their



hulking female counterparts. And when it comes to spider sex, she dominates the male too. During mating she turns her lover into lunch. So, as the female lies enticingly in her web, the male approaches her with understandable trepidation. It's all about timing. After she slips out of her old exoskeleton and into something more comfortable, her fresh body is temporarily soft - and so are her jaws. This is her Achilles heel, an opportunity for the male to jump in, do his business and get out before being eaten. This sort of pressure would affect any fellas' performance, but the male Wasp Spider has a trick up his eight sleeves: he can detach his sexual organs, leave them inside the female and scarper.

I always assumed that jettisoning his genitalia allowed the spider to survive, but almost every mating session ends in death for the male. Scientists have found that after this self-imposed castration, the spider's sexual organs keep on fertilising the female and block other males' attempts at mating. The spider sacrifices his own life to save his member and ensure he becomes a father. Wow, what a way to go.

EDGAR JACKSON - MAYFIELD CONNECTION

Whenever I drive home to Mayfield, I always pay close attention to the High Street near Colkins Mill Church and the Mayfield Lawn Tennis Club. For years after I left Mayfield Primary School, I would often see my former teacher, Mrs Catt, walking there, with a bag in one hand and a smile on her face.

This always seemed strange to me. How could my teacher still be walking home from Mayfield Primary when I had long gone? It was an early indication that, while I might have left a place, life there carries on as normal.

The same can be said for all of Mayfield. The High Street, the playground, the winding roads leading to secret childhood hideouts. Sure, the shops might be different. Arguably, a chunk of Mayfield's identity has been recklessly scooped out by capitalism but you can't rob a place like this of its soul. That remains constant, just as Mrs Catt remains constant.

For me, Mayfield is a special corner of the earth. It's the place where I had my first few ideas as a writer. The place where I dreamt of ghouls and monsters. It's the village that goes dark just a little too quickly. It's the woodland paths with strange engravings on the trees. It's the sign near the Church, with Saint Dunstan fighting off a hideous, twisted devil with red hot pincers (this is something else I look out for every time I return, something that never fails to inspire new nightmares). I live in Edinburgh now, and my first book, Seeing Dead, has just come out. After publication day, my life has become decidedly different. I'm on an unfamiliar road, heading somewhere never trodden. Yet I can always rely on a familiar place to ground me, give me fresh ideas and make me feel at home. Mayfield. East Sussex. And lovely old Mrs Catt walking home with a smile on her face. Because I'm sure she still does.

BRAMBLE

We have a contrary relationship with brambles. They are our late summer passion indulged with purple-fingered blackberry greed. This is one bounty where we all still have the foraging skills of our grandmothers. This hedgerow gathering tradition reaches, bramble-

like, into distant history and is shared by wild and farm creatures alike: with enough grazing pressure there will be a clear nibble-line along a hedgerow.

You will have noticed that the blackberries on your local patch will differ from those in more

foreign fields. Perhaps in viciousness of prickle, ripening time or in blackberry size or in its flavour, sweetness, texture, size and number of the shining beetle-black dark drupelets of the fruit (technically it is not a berry but made up of many tiny fruits). The blackberry has huge variety and is an aggregate group rather than a single species. There is scope here for years of difficult study of their biology - the brave few to take on the challenge are called batologists (confusing, but bátos is taken from ancient Greek for bramble).

Their complex sex life makes them hard to define. The sweet pink-white flowers attract pollinators that fertilise and cross pollinate in the normal way, but seeds can also form by apomixis, an asexual technique of



forming seed without fertilisation. This and simple asexual spread by shoots stretching out to find new ground, making trip wires as they go, produces plants that are clones and genetically the same as the parent. The infrequent sexual reproduction maintains diversity and over 400 micro-species are recognised in the UK. Pick them before the devil-spit arrives, making the fruit mushy and dull after Michaelmas on 29th September. The devil to blame is the flesh-fly that uses enzymes to access an easy fruit juice drink and so ruin our harvest. Briefly mourned, our summer-love is forgotten and our relationship returns to stickflailing curse as they bite into us, tangle sheep, invade our lands, trip us up.

They are extraordinary plants - a key landscape shaper. The High Weald is patched with small fields created from woodland in the Middle Ages. Today we walked through one as it steadily returns to woodland. Clusters of brambles now have rapidly maturing oak or hornbeam in their midst, protected from deer by thorny nest. Reaching stems cross over our narrowing path and we will not go this way next time. On another route, a hollow way created by centuries of the footfall of herded animals is now blocked by brambles. There is a certain admiration for a mere shrubby plant that can achieve such landscape change after hundreds of years of determined human endeavour. These tree nurseries also offer birds safe-keeping of their nested broods from predators. Declining nightingales, warblers, cuckoos choose these places. Leaves were once used as a cure for stomach complaints in both humans and livestock. Young shoots are worth rootling for by badgers, deer and boar. And many many insects, use flowers for a pollen and nectar source. The berries are rich in vitamins and offer us an array of health benefits. They contain polyphenols, powerful antioxidants which may play a role in the reduction of oxidative damage. Enjoy them now in all their variety and try to retain some affection in the dark days of winter.

MAYFIELD BONFIRE SOCIETY

Your Bonfire Boyes and Belles are delighted to announce our next annual Carnival and Torchlit Procession will be held on Saturday 21st September. Mayfield Bonfire Society has held a carnival almost every year for nearly a century, except during times of war, typhoid and Covid. At over a mile long, with 5,000 burning torches, the Mayfield procession is believed to be the longest in Sussex, other than the Lewes Grand United Procession on 5th November. Thousands of people flock to the village each year to take part in the Carnival and watch this spectacular event.

The Map shows the procession routes and approximate timings and there is more

detailed information about the routes and road closures below. Look out for the new set of Bonfire banners hanging in the High Street throughout September, made by our creative team of sewing Boyes and Belles.

As always, we will be collecting for local charities on the night so please do remember to bring cash and give generously. This year we are collecting for Mayfield Youth Band and MAYFACS Shedders, as well as the Scouts, Cricket Club and Senior Citizens Christmas party. You can also donate online at the Bonfire Bar.

We need to raise around £10,000 to put on the Carnival procession and would like to thank the Parish Council for their grant and continuing support for the Bonfire Society. We would also like to thank our members, patrons and friends for their generous support.

You can help us raise funds by using our Bonfire Bar, which will be in its usual place in the High Street beside the cannon, serving Harvey's beers, plus cider, wines and soft drinks. This year we will have an extra small bar outside the Scout Hut from 9pm to help quench thirsts at the end of the processions. There will also be various food stalls in the High Street and the Fun Fair on Court Meadow, together with fireworks at 9.45pm.

Thank you to all our many kind helpers who have made the 5,000 torches in preparation for the torchlit processions, and to all those who work tirelessly over the weekend to put on the village's largest event, and then to clear up again afterwards. An army of volunteers help put up the signs and marshal the roadblocks, set up the radio communications and liaise with the police, set up and man the all-

important bar, make cakes and sandwiches and serve refreshments for visiting societies, and carry collection buckets to raise funds for local charities. Most of the members and volunteers are helping behind the scenes, whilst a small group of Boyes and Belles will dress up to lead the procession.

The Society is looking to recruit more members and volunteers who can help in any way. Whether you love dressing up and walking in the procession, can help the working party make torches, perhaps help out at a fundraising event, or just offer an hour or two of support on the day.

Road Closures And Parking

As usual, most roads in the village will be closed to all vehicles. Road Closures begin at 6pm and affect Tunbridge Wells Road, High Street, Fletching Street (down to Alexandra Terrace junction), East Street (to Sandy Lane junction), The Avenue, and Station Road (including the junction with Stone Cross and Love Lane). Some roads will be opened to traffic once the procession has passed, but the High Street and parts of Tunbridge Wells Road will remain closed until 11.30pm, or until it is safe to open them.

Please respect the Barrier Marshals as most of them are volunteers giving up

their time for this fantastic community event. This is an official Road Closure Order and if contravened may result in prosecution by the Police.

We are asking residents and visitors to please observe the parking restrictions in order to allow unobstructed processions and to avoid damage to parked vehicles. Please do not park anywhere on the procession routes (see map). We cannot accept responsibility for any damage to vehicles or property left on the procession route.


For visitors, parking will be possible along one side of the Tunbridge Wells road, and this road will become one-way, heading away from the village, from 9pm.

Carnival Timetable

Commemoration 6.45pm. The evening begins with a service to remember the dead at the War Memorial, where a wreath will be laid accompanied by a short Eulogy, followed by a minute's silence and lighting of the fiery Poppies.

Processions:

First Procession 7.15pm. Forms up along Station Road (Bands form up at the top of West Street), lights up at the horse trough, then proceeds up the High Street, down



Fletching Street, and stops at the Rose & Crown.

Second Procession 8.15pm. Leaves the Rose and Crown, up Fletching Street, down the High Street, along Station Road to beyond Old Lane, and then turns on itself and returns up Station Road to stop just before the horse trough. Vehicles in the procession will continue to the junction with Love Lane and turn there.

Grand Procession 9.15pm. Lights up at the Horse trough, proceeds up the High Street and around to the gates of Court Meadow where it de-torches.

Fireworks 9.45pm: The fireworks display will commence as soon as the end of the procession has cleared the Court Meadow gates, which we anticipate will be around 9.45pm. Please note no fireworks are permitted by members of the public at our event.

We look forward to seeing you at another spectacular torchlit carnival.

MAYFIELD COMMUNITY & HEALTH CENTRE

The project is now progressing with momentum as the project team spend quite a few days per week monitoring progress, providing the design detail requested by the contractor and attending progress review and workshop meetings.

The general design was shared with the public at the 7th July Information Event and for those who were unable to attend, it can also be found on the Parish Council website. Feedback from the event has been useful with some 80% still supporting the project. A good number of people provided useful suggestions and some, especially relating to how to reduce costs further, are being pursued in some detail.

The joint Wealden District Council/Parish Council Project Board agreed at its 22nd July meeting that the project should now progress to what is known in the trade as RIBA stage 3. This means providing more detail to the design, together with producing supporting information for the forthcoming planning application. There is considerable pressure on the contractor to make the submission by the end of August in order to achieve planning approval in December, and thereby maintain the overall programme schedule.

Specialist meetings have been held to address options for cost savings and in particular the more expensive elements of the mechanical and electrical aspects of the design. Firming up on the design means detailed costings can be undertaken and we can confirm that the current budget will meet the anticipated expenditure.


The legal documentation needed for the Development Agreement with WDC and also the Agreement for Lease with WDC, are now both in the hands of the respective lawyers. On completion a recently formed organisation, known as Mayfield Community Centre CIO, will take a lease on the Community Centre and operate the new Centre once completed in much the same way as for the old Mayfield Memorial Hall. Trustees have been appointed and anyone interested in helping run the CIO should contact them via the Parish Clerk.

ENERGY EXPO, FIVE ASHES VILLAGE HALL - COME AND MEET "EDDI"

Five years ago, the Village Hall committee introduced a number of energy-saving measures into the building with a view to overall cost reduction for the running of the building as well as reducing the overall demand of the energy required to run it. The opportunity arose to incorporate a number of technologies into the redevelopment of the building after the successful bid to the National Lottery. The most recent investment was the installation of further solar panels to complement the existing ones and battery storage to make use of stored energy to offset some of the demand required to run the building overnight. As part of the new installation an "Eddi" was installed which monitored production from the panels and diverted some of this to the immersion heater to provide hot water for the building. On Sunday October 6th, starting at 10.30am, the Hall will be open to anyone who wishes to come and view the various energy saving and generation systems we have in place. There will be a short formal introduction to our strategy in The Ash Hall followed by the opportunity to view the equipment and talk to Energy advisers afterwards. We will be featuring :- Air source heat pumps; Solar panels; Battery storage; Energy Diverter; Led Lighting; Underfloor heating; Motion sensors.

OBITUARY

JENNIFER BOXALL

(An extract from the Eulogy given by Patrick, son of Jennie and Richard)

Jen, Jennie, the Jenster, "Jennifer". Granny, Mother, Mom. DJB, Jennie Bee, DJ Jennie B. Jen was known by a lot of names by the many people whose lives she touched, across time and across three continents and beyond. How do you distil anyone's life into a few words, let alone someone whose life, like Jen's, touched so many? Let me also say upfront that in trying to think this through, another complicating factor was the close relationship Jen had

with Richard over the last 65+ years. They were a model for me, and I am sure others. Full of sage advice, like don't go to bed on an argument (easier said than done), and an example of how to treat each other (most of the time). I am not sure exactly what their secret was, but they were a team. And. this makes it all the more difficult to know exactly where one's influence stopped and the other's started. That all said, I thought I would focus on three different characteristics that I think capture Jennie.

The first is creativity. I think every one of us will remember fondly the personal flare she brought to everything she did. Whether it was a special brooch. Or scarf. A flash of pink. Or a hat when no one else was wearing one. She had her own style. She loved art and was herself an accomplished artist. Taking up painting when she moved to the United States, she demonstrated a real talent. This echoed earlier artistic outlets - for example, dance and dressmaking. She also loved music and singing. Under the heading creativity, I also put Jen's many entrepreneurial and professional endeavours. Over the years these included modelling, fitness instruction, makeup sales, interior design, and writing a magazine column - all of which she was passionate about and any of which I am sure she could have championed. Frequently circumstances intervened, and putting family first, she moved in a different direction.

Which brings me to the second characteristic, and perhaps the most important – generosity. Jennie was an extraordinarily generous person, giving of her time, good humour, and love, especially when it came to her family and friends.

When work demanded that Richard moved within the UK, then to the USA, then back,

Jennie helped carve out a new life with each move.

We didn't make it easy for her by living so far apart, but Jennie had a gravitational pull that strengthened the bond between the many branches of our family. And, while not as frequent as she would have liked, shared family occasions were really important to Jen. She also showed her generosity in the friendships she forged. Jen was capable of making friends anywhere - in church, in a doctor's office. on a bus, in the checkout at the supermarket. Jennie was the kind of person who drew people in. And she rewarded everyone she met with genuine interest, openness, and sometimes brutal honesty.

Which brings me to the last characteristic I wanted to highlight, and for want a of better word, that is tenacity. Jen was tenacious in everything she did. She had a very clear vision of how things should look, or what people should do, and she was not shy about expressing her opinion and seeing something through the way she saw fit. She liked it the way she liked it. If she was thinking something, you could be pretty sure she'd say it out loud.

Raising children was an area she had lots of ideas that she was glad to express. When we moved into our new house 25+ years ago, Jen insisted on helping us "organise" the cupboard we use to store towels, using a permanent black pen to add labels on the shelves with phrases like "cloaks hands" and "face child" that make absolutely no sense to an American. And, by the way, who writes in pen all over her son and daughter in-law's new house? Every time I see it, Jen's "graffiti" brings a smile to my face.

As we bookend Jen's life, I am reminded of my first living memory, which not surprisingly featured Jen. I must have been about 3 years old and starting pre-school and I was scared. This was the last thing I wanted to do. As Jen dressed me that morning on the landing, in sunshine, looking through the window toward the pre-school, she said exactly the right things to convince me that while it was going to be hard, it was what I needed to do, and it was going to be OK.

Of course, this is what Mothers do. But what has really struck me over the last few days as I have remembered this "bookend" in my own life is that Jen had reached the same conclusions about her next chapter: while it was going to be hard, it was what she needed to do, and she was going to be OK.

As we say goodbye, the same goes for the rest of us, too.
